SOME NEW LAWS.

NEW FRUIT LAW.

J. H. Casey, of Ashland, northern commissioner for the 3rd district of this state has been reappointed to this office, the new term running for two years from April next.

The 3rd district embraces Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Lake, Klamath, Coos and Curry counties.

Commissioner Casey says that heretofore he has been lenient in enforcing the law for the extermination of orchard pests, partly because unfavorable seasons have shortened the crop, and the prevailing prices have been low. This year, however, the prospects for a big crop were never more favorable and, for these reasons, the commissioner will demand a strict compliance with the new law for the protection of orchards and ornamental trees. This law, which was passed at the recent session of the legislature is of so much local interest that we print it in full as follows:

"An act to protect the fruit and hop industry of the state of Oregon, enacted by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon:

"Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation owning or operating any nursery, fruit orchard of any kind, hop yards, flower gardens or ornamental trees to throw cuttings or prunings from any fruit trees, nursery stock, ornamental trees or hop vines into any public road, highway, field or other enclosure, or into any water course of any kind; but shall destroy such cutting or prunings with fire within 30 days from the time such cuttings or prunings are made.

"Sec. 2. It shall hereafter be the duty of any person, firm or corporation owning or operating any such nursery, fruit orchard, hop yards, flower garden or ornamental trees, and knowing such to be infected with any kind of insect, pest, or disease, to immediately spray or destroy the same in such manner as the fruit commissioner of the district may direct.

"Sec. 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation in doing business in the state of Oregon to sell Paris green, arsenic, London purple, sulphur, or any spray material or compound for spraying purposes, in quantities exceeding one pound without providing with each package a self-addressed envelope signed by the seller thereon, guaranteeing the quality and per cent of purity of said materials.

"Sec. 4. Any person, firm or corporation selling any of the above materials which do not conform with the certificate furnished therewith shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$25, nor more than \$100.

"Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to import any infected or diseased fruit of any kind into the state of Oregon.

"Sec. 6. Every person who packs or prepares for shipment to any point without the state or who delivers or causes to be delivered to any express agent or railroad agent, or other person, or to any transportation company or corporation for shipment to any point without the state, any fruit or fruits, either fresh, cured or dried, that is infected with insects, pests or diseases injurious to trees, shrubs, plants, fruits or vegetables, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

"Sec. 7. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100.

"Sec. 8. It shall be the duty of the commissioner of the state board of horticulture of the district in which a violation of this act occurs to present the evidence of the case to the district attorney, whose duty it shall be to prosecute any person guilty of a violation of this act, which prosecution shall be brought in any of the justice courts of this state.

"Sec. 9. Inasmuch as the horticultural interests of the state demand immediate attention this act shall take its full force and effect from and after its approval by the governor."

DRIVER'S ROAD LAW.

Senate bill No. 5, introduced by Mr. Driver, and which was filed in the state department by the governor, Feb. 24th, with his approval, is considered a most meritorious measure. It provides for working prisoners confined in the county jail, on the public roads, under the direction of the county court. The law will go into effect on May 24, 1899, ninety days from the date of its receipt in the state department with the governor's approval. The law is brief and to the point, and reads as follows:

"An act to provide for working convicts on the public highways.—Be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon:

"Sec. 1. That all convicts who are able-bodied men and sentenced by any court of legal authority, whether in default of the payment of a fine or committed for a definite number of days to serve a sentence in the county jail, shall during the period of such sentence be under the exclusive and entire control of the county court where the crime was committed; and said county court shall have full power to put such convicts under the control of any road supervisor, who shall have all the authority of a sheriff to guard and keep such convicts while in his custody from the time of leaving the jail until the return to the county jail.

"Sec. 2. In all cases where sentence of the court is for a definite number of days, the person so sentenced shall be held to labor for the full period to which he has been adjudged, and in all cases of fine imposed in default of the payment of such fine such person shall be made to labor at a compensation of \$1 per day until such fine is fully paid, and in all cases not less than eight hours shall be considered a day's labor.

"Sec. 3. Any convict sentenced in accordance with the provisions of this act, refusing to perform the labor herein required, shall be denied all food, other than bread and water, until he signifies his willingness to comply with the provisions of this act; and for all days or parts of days lost by such refusal such convict shall be made to labor until all lost time shall be made up and the sentence of the court shall be fully met."

TO PROTECT FISH AND GAME.

The recent legislature made many changes in the laws for the protection of the fish and game of the state of Oregon and parties interested should carefully look over the summary of what it is lawful to do and not to do in hunting and fishing.

Deer, moose and mountain sheep, protected from November 1 to July 15, and the killing for marketing of such game animals prohibited entirely.

Spotted laws, not to be killed at all, beaver, killing of, prohibited for 20 years. Silver gray squirrel, protected from January 1 to October 1.

Grouse, prairie chickens, pheasants, Mongolian pheasants, quail and partridges, protected in Western Oregon between December 1 and October 1.

Grouse, protected in Eastern Oregon between November 1 and August 1.

Prairie chicken, protected in Eastern Oregon between November 15 and September 1.

NICKEL-IN-THE-SLOT MACHINES.

Among the bills filed by the governor yesterday, and which become laws immediately, is senate bill No. 39, introduced by Mr. Protzel, the purpose of which law is the suppression of nickel-in-the-slot machines and similar devices. This bill carried an emergency clause, and is therefore now a law, and in full operation. Following is the bill in full:

"An act to prohibit the maintaining, conducting, operating, playing or using nickel-in-the-slot machines, or other devices of like character, wherein are used cards, dice or any substitute therefor, or wherein there enters any element of chance—Be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon:

"Sec. 1. Each and every person who shall conduct, maintain or operate, either as owner, proprietor, lessee or employee, or who shall play or use any nickel-in-the-slot machine or other device of like character, wherein are used cards, dice, or any substitute therefor, or wherein there enters any element of chance, whether the same be played or operated for money, checks, credits, or any other thing of representative value, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50.

"Sec. 2. Justices of the peace shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit court in all offenses under this act.

"Sec. 3. Inasmuch as the public demands this enactment in the interest of morality, and that the same shall go into effect at once, the same shall be operative from and after its approval by the governor."
