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H. S. STRANGE DEAD

Dies at His Home After a Protracted Illness.

A SKETCH OF HIS LIFE

He Was Most Eminent High Priest of the Royal Arch Masons of Oregon.

Oregon City, Or., March 6.—Henry S. Strange, most eminent high priest of the Royal Arch Masons of Oregon, and school superintendent of Clackamas county, died at his home in this city at 2 o'clock p. m. today of cancerous complications and rheumatism.

Henry S. Strange was born in East Tennessee, March 8, 1832. When five years of age he moved with his parents to Illinois, and four years later the family came to Oregon, and settled on a farm near Willer, Douglas county. He attended the Willer academy, and subsequently finished a course in the Willamette university. He took an active interest in educational matters, and early came to be considered as one of the most prominent educators of the state.

Mr. Strange was a prominent figure of the Royal Arch Masons, and at the time of his death was most eminent high priest of that order. He was also a past master of the Woodmen of the World, and a leading member of the First Presbyterian church in this city. Dr. J. W. Strange of Roseburg and Rev. F. G. Strange of Ashland, are his brothers.

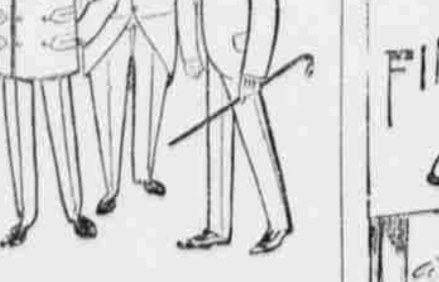
