Why do not the farmers of Douglas county raise more poultry, and better poultry? There is no better or more healthy meat for the table than poultry, and yet it is almost impossible to obtain a chicken, old or young, large or small in the city. Any kind of old hens sell at from \$3.50 to \$4 per dozen and they are hard to get at that or any price. And when you get one it is about as large as a crow and not much better adapted for table use. There ought to be a hundred poultry ranches in Douglas county. There is money in it for the man or woman who will go into the business, as a business, and use some judgment and considerable industry in connection with it. Portland is one of the best poultry markets in the country. San Francisco is perhaps the best in the United States. Hundreds of carloads of poultry are shipped from the middle states to the Pacific Coast every year, and Eastern poultry brings almost a third more per dozen in the market than Oregon chickens. The reason for this is that for years the people of Oregon have bred poultry for egg producers because eggs formerly brought big prices. Now the breed of chickens which produces the greatest number of eggs in a year is not the best for table use. If farmers would quit raising the small breeds of chickens and raise the larger breeds, they could make money at it.

WAREHOUSE BURNED

Roseburg Has Another Big Fire Monday Night

BUILDING AND CONTENTS BURN

Probable Work of an Incendiary Causes the Loss of the Warehouse and a Large Amount of Grain and Flour.

At about 10:45 last Monday night, flames were noticed issuing from the upper portion of Sol Abraham's big warehouse situated on the S. P. railroad track north of the depot.
The fire department was soon on the ground, and had water on the flames but so rapidly had the fire burned that it was soon evident that nothing could be done in the way of saving the main building, and the boys turned their attention to the adjoining buildings. So effective was their work in this direction that not only was the fire confined to the warehouse, but the adjoining building used as a boiler house, was saved. It was fortunate for the owners of property in the neighborhood, that the roofs of buildings had been thoroughly soaked by the recent rains, as the fire was extremely hot and burning brands were scattered over a large area.
The building belonged to Hon. Sol Abraham, and probably cost, when new, in the neighborhood of \$8000, and was insured for \$2000. The contents of the building, consisting principally of grain and flour, is almost a total loss. Probably the heaviest loser was Willis Kramer the Myrtle Creek miller, as he had almost a car load, 500 sacks, of flour stored in the building on which he had no insurance.
Other losses were: Cyrus Smith about 800 bushels of wheat, with \$500 insurance, Henry Linder 1400 bushels of wheat, insured for \$800, T. R. Sheridan 400 bushels wheat insured for \$200 J. D. Mann, about 300 bushels of barley uninsured. Two or three others had small amounts of grain in the building and were probably not insured. Dozier & Martin, who had the warehouse leased had considerable grain, flour and feed in the building, but fortunately for them, they were reasonably well insured. H. S. French, the Postal Telegraph line foreman, lost considerable property belonging both to himself and the company which he has stored in the building. The fire was no doubt the work of an incendiary, as there had been no fire about the house during the day and the outside of the building was so thoroughly soaked by the late rains that it could not have been started by a spark from the outside.

Calapooia.
