On last Thursday morning intelligence reached this city of a serious accident which occurred at Roberts creek early in the morning of that day. It appears that Wm. Cooper, a young man well and favorably known throughout the county and a son of the Hon. Philo Cooper, was assisting in driving a band of cattle, when the horse, which he was riding, on being stopped quickly fell backward to the ground, the horn of the saddle striking Mr. Cooper in the abdomen. He was taken to his home near by and medical aid was immediately summoned but of no avail, the injuries sustained were of such a serious nature that the skill of the physician could give no relief, and at 5 o'clock p. m. death came to relieve his sufferings.

Deceased was aged 27 years, six months and three days. He was a young man of exemplary character, upright, honest and in every respect worthy of the highest esteem in which he was held by his fellow-men. He was a candidate for county treasurer on the union ticket at the last election.

Funeral services were conducted at the family residence last Saturday at 9 o'clock a. m., Rev. W. G. Miller at the service. The remains were brought to the cemetery for interment in the Masonic cemetery, where the last and rites were conducted by the members of the I. O. O. F.
