**Crop and Fruit Prospects.**  
PORTLAND, May 23.—The bulletin for the corresponding week last year announced general rains and low temperature, how opportune they were and the great benefit to crops. The same conditions prevailed this year, but so much weather of the same kind has preceded that, instead of a benefit, it has been injurious. The soil is cold and wet. Seeding has been delayed, and now cannot be finished before June 10th; then, should warm, dry weather prevail, the late spring crop will not amount to much. Fall-sown grain has made little growth, though it has an excellent stand; early-sown spring grain is doing well on the higher land. Warmer weather will be of great benefit to the grain crop.

Fruit continues to drop, and especially so for prunes. In some orchards the Italian prunes will be an absolute failure; in others, a small crop is probable. The peaches and silver prunes have not fallen so badly, and they are expected to give a fair yield.

Cherries and pears have been dropping, but as a rule, good crops will be obtained. The peach crop in the southern counties is good; in the northern counties there will be very few for shipment. Apples are yet blooming and a good crop is promised. The cause of the dropping is evidently due to the cold soil and absence of heat to force the sap up the trees; the small fruit is therefore literally starved to death, and it then drops to the ground.

The fruit, today, promises to be a smaller crop than was ever before grown in the state. Gooseberries are now being marketed. Strawberries are ripening slowly and promise a good crop. Other berries are in good condition, except in a few localities, where they were winter killed. Cranberries are in bloom; they, too, are backward, but are not injured. Raspberries are in bloom. The cranberry crop in Curry, is in head. The hay crop is most promising. Hope for making vigorous growth. The halftone on the 17th cut the heads from vines in a few yards. Hope are today the most promising of all crops in the state. Pasturage is good and stock is in good condition.

The streams are full of water and the miners have a good supply for placer mining. The frosts did not materialize. Garden produce is not making rapid growth. Potatoes and corn planting continue.

Crops, as a rule, will not be as good this year as they were last, but there will be no general failure of any crop.

The weather conditions are now favorable for an early change to fair, warmer weather.

**A New Amusement Device**  
A new spectacular device called the panoramas, which was one of the drawing cards at the Turin (Italy) exposition last year, is soon to be introduced to summer pleasure-seekers in America by John Chastres.

The panoramas is an illusion apparatus on a large scale, which gives the beholder an exact impression of a railway journey from Rome to Pompeii. The spectator takes his seat in a railway car which stands in what is to all appearances an ordinary station. Directly, with the proper accompaniment of rattle and jerk, the train seems to move out into the open—this effect being gained by the movement of the station walls. The scenery is perfectly reproduced by the rapidly moving strips of canvas and the effect is said to be surprisingly realistic. The landscapes were painted by Italian artists and are those used in Turin. Mr. Chastres, who with two other Americans, has secured the sole rights for this country has also completed negotiations for the establishment of the panoramas at Coney Island, Philadelphia and Chicago.
