The death of that grand old pioneer jurist, Hon. B. F. Harding, at his beautiful farm home near Cottage Grove last Friday, recalls an era in Oregon political affairs belonging to the territorial and early state period that is of special interest at this time when pioneer memories are rife. Judge Harding, as he was familiarly known, was one of the few remaining of the old race of solid, upright and progressive pioneer politicians, and as a champion of democracy figured conspicuously in the early politics of this state. Though not an aged man his life has covered a period that marked the development of Oregon from a veritable wilderness into a state ranking as one of the foremost west of the Rocky mountains.

Judge Harding was a personal friend of the editor of this paper, we having been in his employ several years before entering into the newspaper business. Though having amassed a great fortune through his thrift and industry, he was a man devoid of ostentation and possessed of a genial temperament. He was public spirited and always deeply concerned in whatever affected the welfare of his fellowmen and his country. Together with his only son, D. W. Harding, he took great pleasure in the supervision of their vast interests. He enjoyed to the uttermost in his years of rest and retirement the friendship of a wide circle of admiring friends won by an honorable, sympathetic and useful life. His energy, ability and integrity contributed much to bring about the present glory of our great state, and while fortune liberally rewarded his practical labors, the crown of life grew out of those elements of his character which won for him the esteem of his fellow citizens.

"A traveling man who visited La Plaisa a few days ago received a letter which opened his eyes with regard to the importance of trade. He was representing a stove house and the firm which he represented wrote him a pleasant little note which ran about as follows: 'This company has entered the American street trade and after June 15th we will dispense with the service of all of our traveling salesmen. We regret that this action is necessary as we recognize your valuable service in the past. Trusting you will meet with much success in other fields, etc.' The letter means that the firm is no longer possible or necessary and hardware men predict that inside of a year there will not be a stove agent on the road. This is a pretty tough condition, but it proves to what end we are eventually coming. It means an advancement all along the line and it means further that any political party which expects to survive the present century must take a decided position against trusts and maintain it to the bitter end. The fight between the people and combinations is coming and when it does the people must win." Press, La Plaisa, Mo.

It recognizes the dangerous tendencies toward trusts and combinations, but it does not attempt to change them up to any particular party. And this is the right course to pursue. This should be no party question. The republican party, we know, is just as absolutely opposed to trusts as the democratic party can possibly be, and the power of all parties should and will be invoked to combat these gigantic combinations that threaten human happiness, progress and liberty.
