W. E. The increase he says is due to the fact that Dominion, Sulphur and Hunter creeks, which were practically unworked last season, have been developed to a considerable extent with favorable results, and the bench claims on Eldora, Bonanza, Hunter and Dominion have been worked to such an extent that their output will greatly increase the total production. Gold Run, which is practically the only new creek in the district, has also shown up well. The portion of Dawson which was destroyed by fire on April 20 is rapidly being rebuilt. Mr. Lundy informs us, and the town is very lively. After a brief visit with his folks Mr. Lundy is enroute returning to the Klondike, probably in September.
