We know the past; the present is with us and the future will be moulded as we put forth effort. The contrast between the present and what was fifty years ago is a remarkable one. Inventive genius and the research have so changed the conditions that it seems out a dream to the pioneer, and he can hardly realize the blessings of the age which progress and improvement have brought to pass. Had you told him back in the early '50s that the long and weary six months required to cross the plains would be in so short time reduced to three days he would not have believed you. As he contemplates the change wrought by the iron horse electricity and other improvements and inventions, he is lost in amazement. Great has been the reward of those who braved the privations to reach, claim, build up and make Oregon one of the grandest states in the Union. But the pioneer of the past passing away; his work so nearly begun will be left to more recent arrivals and to the native born to carry forward. It is the duties, institutions and development of the state are to keep pace with the revealed age and to progress and prosper to those whom its destiny is entrusted must be on the alert when and where to move for advancement of interests can be made. The history of the world reads that no state or nation ever became wealthy which depended upon agriculture alone for support, relying upon other countries to provide the products of mechanical industry. Peace commission has offered Philippine \$5 each if they come into Manila and into their guns. Senator Depew believes we should send an overwhelming force to crush the Aguinaldo insurrection. Gen. Otis is hopeful of the success of his negotiations with the insurgent leaders of Cavite province. A movement is on foot to build a high-way 100 feet wide the entire length of the state of Connecticut. Alabama anti-imperialists are urging the governor to declare vacant the seat of the Congressman John Wheeler.

News from Guatemala indicates that both England and Germany threaten to make a naval demonstration there. A 40,000,000 bushel wheat yield is the kind of a handsome the farmers are becoming accustomed to in Oklahoma. The Klondike exhibit at the Paris Exposition next year will include four tons of virgin gold, valued at \$2,000,000.

J. P. Bryant, of Bardwell, Ky., is said to be the owner of the largest strawberry patch in the world. It covers 1700 acres. Hundreds of men are drifting down the Yukon hoping that the United States government will bring them home. It is probable that the president will defer his trip to Minneapolis until October unless Mrs. McKinley's health improves.

All the American hotels and saloons in Santiago have been ordered closed and the sale of intoxicants to Americans forbidden. After riding thirty miles on his bicycle, Harry Park, of Smoking Valley, Pa., drank copiously of ice water and fell dead. The 9th Ohio Regiment will present to Miss Helen (widow) a magnificent medal in recognition of her gift of care to the men while they were in Cuba.

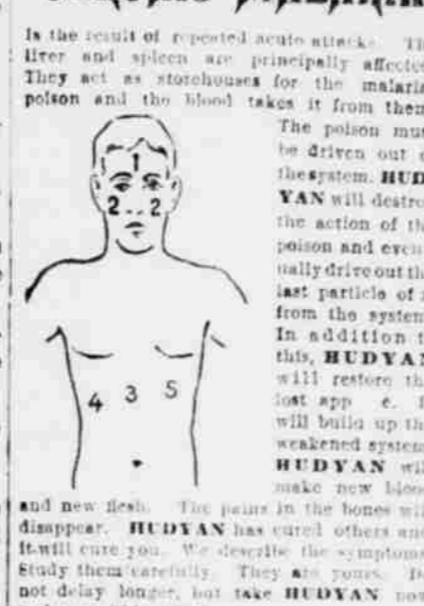
The Chicago appellate Court decides that a marriage contracted by a third person is "void at law and in equity as being opposed to morality and public policy." The general opinion at Manila is that a large force will be required to establish peace, because it will be necessary to garison many places to protect peaceful natives. A Missouri penitentiary inmate has written a letter declaring that Gilbert Gray for whose murder twenty-eight years ago Alexander Lester is under arrest, was alive in 1894.

A statement has been prepared at the Navy department showing that during the fiscal year just closed 16,123 men enlisted in the naval service, of whom 2143 were enlisted for the war only. There were 738 boys under instruction. Twelve discharged sailors of the battleship Iowa, who have landed at Seattle for Brooklyn, N. Y., say they will lay before Secretary Long a complaint regarding rations issued aboard the Iowa. They claim the rations are inferior. Mexico is raising hopes for her own brewery this year. The exports of hops from the United States during the nine months, ending March last, were \$1963, the same period last year, \$31,433, and the same period, ending March, 1897, \$49,561.

The Paris campaign was temporarily unmanageable while entering Falmouth harbor, but was eventually brought under control. The superintendent of the wrecking companies asserted his belief in the existence of a current which draws vessels toward the Maracas. Admiral Dewey's salary amounts to \$37,500 a day; President McKinley's is about \$131 a day; Cabinet officers, the Vice President and the speaker of the House get \$22,224 a day; Senators and Congressmen, \$13,000, and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, \$29 a day. Gen. Wade Hampton and his daughter, since the destruction by fire of their handsome home and fortune, have been living in two small rooms in Columbus, S. C. In an interview, Gen. Hampton said: "I feel that I did not lose anything in that fire, for I saved my sword from the flames."

Edward Simon, state house janitor, testified before the Nebraska Senate, that he had been the conspirator to count in the two Populist judges was that he had been promised, if elected, that he would be in his favor a case in the Supreme Court in which he was interested. Says Edison: "We will turn out a conveyance that will not cost as much as the average horse and wagon, and that of running will be a minimum. With the automobile and the cheap bicycle will be the field again, pretty soon, ought to be able to own a horseless carriage. The lessened demand for the animal, which will be supplanted still further in course of time by automobile power, moving machines, harvesters and farm wagons, horses may become as much of a drug on the market as dogs. The only thing likely to bar their possession by the average man in moderate circumstances will be the cost of keeping them."
