Myrtle Point News.

(The Enterprise.)

Chas. Dodge and wife of Roseburg, who have been visiting with relatives in this city, returned home Thursday.

Last Saturday as Henry Knight was driving on the road with a hay rake, the rake came off the horse and it ran away. The lever which raises and lowers the rake struck the horse and it kicked, striking Knight in the face and knocking him from the seat and under the rake where he was dragged for quite a distance, only escaping by being rolled into a ditch, when it passed over him. He was badly bruised, and the bones of his nose were all broken. Dr. Lepp dressed his wounds which are very painful, but not serious.

R. W. Lundy and son, Will, returned from a visit to the mines Sunday last. Mr. Lundy visited both the "Mountain Daisy" and "Star" mines owned by the Harrisons while gone, and says that they are just as the Harrisons had represented them to him, and he is satisfied they have very valuable mines, which conclusion he arrived at after practical tests of the rock and dirt. At the Mountain Daisy they have gone down 7 or 8 feet on a vein in the solid porphyry by blasting and take out about 1 1/2 ounces of gold per day from the dirt in this vein, while any of the dirt for a distance of 800 feet along the hillside is pay dirt. Mr. Lundy is of the opinion, however, that the Star, which appears to be a well defined ledge in place, and which is rich in free gold, will prove the greater bonanza.

The contract for doing the work on the jetties at the mouth of the Coquille river was awarded to John Korman at Portland on the 23d, for \$24,757. The north jetty is to be run out 500 feet and the south jetty extended 310 feet. The rock needed will be about 49,000 tons and will be taken from the Tupper quarry near the south jetty. The Coos bay contract was awarded to Wakefield A. Jacobson for \$123,710. This job involves the moving of 200,000 tons of rock from Coos river to the jetty and depositing it on that portion of the jetty already constructed, bringing it up to high tide. Work on the jetties will probably commence September 1st, as the stipulations provide that work shall begin within 30 days after signing contracts. The Coquille work is to be completed in 10 and that at the bay in 20 months.
