Colonel Kobbie, now in Manila, will have charge of the regiment and Edwin P. Dummer has been appointed lieutenant colonel. After the recruiting officers secure the whole complement of men the regiment will rendezvous at Vancouver barracks for drill and preparation for the voyage. This is an excellent opportunity for anyone desiring military life, for the reason that a majority of the officers are West Point men, and the regiment is promised immediate active service.

General Joseph Longstreet, the noted cavalry leader of the civil war, whose dashing and daring won many an advantage for the confederate forces, arrived in Portland yesterday, accompanied by Mr. Longstreet, Miss Young blood, Miss Armstrong, and his secretary, Lewis W. Haskell, of Washington, D. C. General Longstreet holds the office of United States railroad commissioner, and is making his annual tour of inspection of the land-grant and bonded roads, in preparation for the report which he submits to the secretary of the interior in November. The general is hale and hearty and in excellent health, although his hair has been whitened by the frost of many winters. His tall, erect form and military bearing are marks which would easily distinguish him in any gathering.

Ernest Dutschky Is Found Guilty of an Assault Upon His Wife.

In Justice Miller's court today Ernest Dutschky of Wardton, was found guilty of assault and battery upon his wife. Last week he had the prosecuting witness arrested for insanity but an examination convinced the authorities that the charge was unfounded and she was released only to bring the husband before the bar of justice.

Justice Miller, on hearing the evidence was convinced of the truth in main of the prosecuting witness' story, and found the defendant guilty as charged, imposing a fine of \$50 which he will board out in the county jail.
