ROSEBURG, Aug. 12.—The recent trouble at the Helena mine in the Bohemia district in which Deputy United States Mineral Surveyor C. M. Collier was prevented from making a survey, was brought before United States Commissioner Walton today.

The first case was the United States against James J. Jennings, charged with forcibly hindering a survey of mineral lands. He waived examination and was bound over at \$2000.

In the second case, R. J. Jennings, R. G. Martin, H. D. Taffet, Jack Beck, Robert Martin and John Doe were charged with obstructing the view of the surveyor engaged in his work. R. J. Jennings was bound over to the United States grand jury, and the others were discharged.

MEMORIAL SERVICES.

In Honor of the Douglas County Boys Who Did Not Return.

An appropriate and very imposing memorial service was held in the Opera House Sunday at 3 o'clock p.m., in honor of the five fallen heroes of Co. B. The stage and interior of the building through out was handsomely and profusely decorated with flags and bunting. At the front of the stage in front of the speakers and chorus, was placed five vacant chairs which were handsomely draped with bunting and overhung with crepe.

Rev. John Dawson of the Episcopal church, opened the service and made a few well chosen remarks, urging that the contributions intended for the Douglas County Soldiers' Monument fund be made at the earliest possible date in order to complete the fund and secure the monument that the unveiling ceremonies might take place the same time that the final ceremonies are held over the remains of the deceased volunteers.

At the close of the opening remarks by Rev. Dawson, the chorus led in the singing of "America."

A scripture lesson was then read from the Psalm by Dr. J. A. Townsend, of the Presbyterian church, Rev. W. A. Wood, of the Christian church, invoking the divine blessing.

A chorus consisting of some 25 or 30 voices under the direction of Hon. J. H. Shupe, then sang a beautiful song entitled, "All Hail Us Ye Free."

Rev. J. T. Cotton of the M. E. Church South, then read a passage of scripture which was followed by a solo quartet entitled "They'd Answer to the R. H. Call," by Messrs. J. H. Shupe, Dr. Chas. W. F. Wright and W. C. Conner.

Rev. S. A. Douglas of the Baptist Church, then delivered the address which was eloquent and impressive. He said those five brave men who left their lives in their country's cause.

Next followed the memorial song by the chorus entitled, "Fading on the Heavenly Heights."

Then followed roll call and as the names of the five fallen heroes were called a beautiful floral wreath was placed on each of the five vacant chairs.

The services concluded with the singing of "Blest be the Tie" by the present. A large crowd was present, however many of the volunteers who reside in the country were absent owing to the inclemency of the weather.

The hearts and fullest sympathies of our people go out to those among us whose boys will never come home. Their sorrow is intensified by the general rejoicing and the reception accorded company B. They died in the service of their country. No better epitaph may be written.

The deceased members of Co. B. are: W. H. Roberts, of Dillard, died at Camp Merritt, of pneumonia, August 30, 1898. John Fenton, of near Oakland, died at Manila, October 10, 1898. Jas. W. Brown of Wilbur, died of pneumonia at Camp Merritt, Aug. 12, 1899. Geo. W. Starmer, of Roseburg, died at Cavite, Sept. 27, 1898. H. B. Adams, of French Settlement, killed in battle, March 27, 1899.
