JOSEPHINE COUNTY ACCIDENT.

Tragic Death of Jesse Alden Payne of Althouse.

The people of this vicinity were shocked by the tragic death of Mr. J. A. Payne, son of J. M. Payne, an old and honored resident of Althouse.

Mr. Payne had purchased a new saddle and then borrowed a pony of Mr. McCourt to take it home. Having taken the saddle home he brought the pony back to Mr. McCourt's, where he was told to put the animal in the pasture.

Mr. Payne then mounted the horse without saddle or bridle, having only a rope by which to guide the animal, and started down the lane leading to the pasture on a gallop. It was now evening and the cows were coming up from the pasture. Unfortunately, the running horse collided with one of the cows. The shock of the collision threw Mr. Payne over the pony's head; the cow, from the impetus received from the force of the collision, rolled over on the horse, thus both animals were precipitated on the prostrate man.

Had it not been for some soft mud in which Mr. Payne had fallen, he would have been instantly crushed to death. As it was, a blood vessel was ruptured in his chest which caused his death later.

The funeral took place Sunday at 11 a.m., and was the largest ever witnessed in this valley. The services were held in the Althouse M. E. church and were conducted by Rev. J. Sams, of Wilderville, who had been called by telephone the evening previous. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery near Kerby.—Rogue River Courier, Aug. 31.

H. D. McGuire's Hat Found.

A hat identified as that worn by Fish Commissioner H. D. McGuire, who was drowned in the North Umpqua river in April, was found last buried in the sand near the old Cole ferry, a few miles below the scene of the drowning, by W. R. Thompson Monday, and was delivered to the PLAINDEALER office Tuesday by W. T. Emery and placed on exhibition.

The hat is in good condition considering the long time it has been buried in the sand and water. It is a derby hat, about a number 7 1/2 and bears the brand "Bosham & Pendleton, Sole Agents, Portland, Oregon," on the inside. It will be sent to the family.

The fear is now entertained that Senator Reed's body, like this hat, has been weighted down or covered with sand and will never rise.

A Noted Pioneer Dead.

Herman Marks of this city, received a dispatch this morning from Portland notifying him of the death of his uncle, Asner Marks, in that city at 6 o'clock this morning. Mr. Marks had been in poor health for some time and was in the city for treatment at the time of his death.

He was an early settler, having come to the state in '52, and settled in Roseburg in '54. He was a Mason in high degree, and will be buried under the auspices of that order at 2 o'clock, p. m. tomorrow in the city of Portland.
