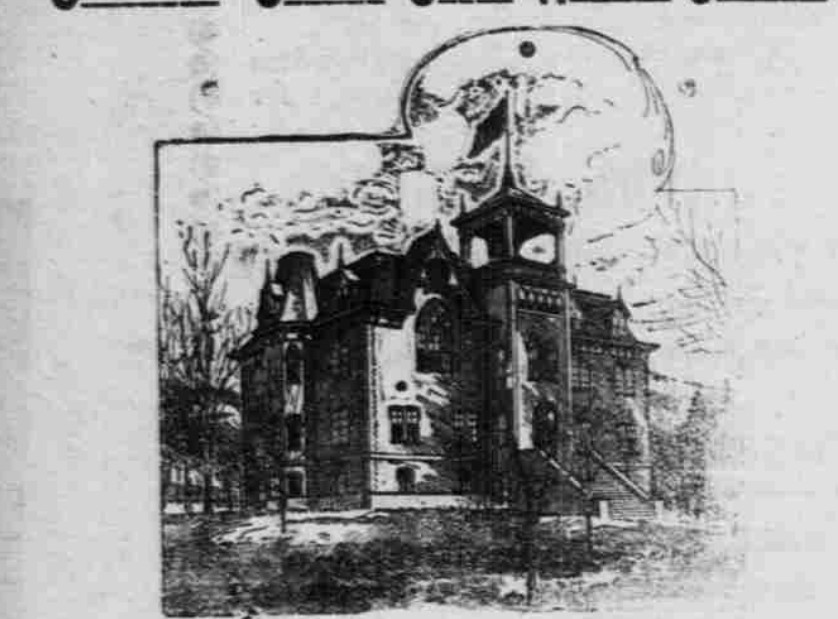

## National Encampment G. A. R.

The National Encampment of the G. A. R. and auxiliary organizations at Philadelphia has been brought to a close and the following is an outline of the business transacted:

At the National encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, Judge Rousier, St. Louis, withdrew as commander-in-chief and Col. Albert D. Shaw, of Watertown, New York, was elected by acclamation.

Irvine Bobier, Indianapolis, was elected senior vice commander; H. M. Minto, Louisville, junior vice commander; William H. Baker, Lynn, Mass., surgeon general.

The report of Thomas J. Stewart, adjutant-general, shows that the total membership of the Grand Army of the Republic in good standing June 30, 1898, was 7213 posts, with a membership of 305,003; on December 31, 1898, 7178 posts, with a membership of 298,748; and on June 30, 1899, 6965 posts with a membership of 287,882.

Expanded in relief during the year \$100,555.64. The year 1898 was the high-water mark in membership (409,498); every year since then has shown a decrease.

One year ago he reported a decrease of \$46 33 in per capita tax as compared with the previous year. This year there is a decrease in the sale of supplies over the year ending June 30, 1898, is \$2242.22. The adjutant-general includes in his report a comparative list of receipts and expenditures from 1890 to 1899 inclusive, showing a gradual decrease in both these items.

The report of the quartermaster-general, Frederick W. Spink, of Chicago, shows the funds on hand October 7, 1899, amounted to \$9890 48. Receipts since then have been \$17,018 20 making a total of \$26,908 68. Expenditures have amounted to \$14,636 23, leaving a balance of \$11,672 45.

The next annual encampment will be held at Chicago.

## Not Enough Pensions.

New York, Sept. 12.—Albert D. Shaw, the new commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., said last night: "A great deal of my time will be given to pension legislation. The old soldier is entitled to lasting consideration. What if the pension roll is large, the Union soldiers saved this nation. Their reward should be commensurate with their services. If the burden should prove too heavy, I am in favor of a patriotic pension bond issue, so that only the interest would have to be met from year to year. Let posterity meet the bonds when they mature. Why not? The country was saved to posterity. It is only proper that a part of the burden should fall on posterity."

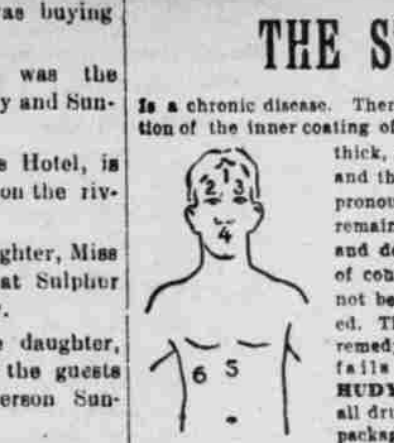
Bigamist—A foolish man who thinks he can manage more than one woman at a time.
