Will Outfit at Portland.

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—Senator Simon arrived in Washington at 2 o'clock yesterday, and before night he had succeeded in knocking General Shafter and the San Francisco quartermaster out, figuratively speaking.

These gentlemen, upon finding that the Thirty-fifth regiment was to sail from Portland had declared that the transports could only be fitted out in San Francisco. The department, acting upon the advice of these men, had so ordered it.

Senator Simon did not travel all the way to Washington for the fun of the trip. As soon as he reached the capital, he went to see the quartermaster-general and explained the true situation. He then went to Secretary Root, and laid the case before him. He showed the secretary's plan that coal and other supplies could be had as cheaply in Portland as anywhere on the coast and assured him that the facilities for putting supplies aboard the ships were as ample here as at San Francisco.

Secretary Root at once gave the order to the adjutant-general that the transports be outfitted here in place of at San Francisco, provided it could be done without causing any delay. He was assured by the senator that no delay would result from outfitting here, so the order was made.

The Elder will not come for the troops, as at first reported. The City of Rio de Janeiro and the Sikh have been designated as the two transports to carry the Thirty-fifth, and they will proceed here for the purpose of taking aboard supplies preparatory for the voyage to Manila.

The two ships can accommodate 1000 men, and are said to be excellent vessels. The Rio de Janeiro has long been in the Pacific Oriental mail service.
