### A LUCKY ROSEBURGER

L. D. Carle Returns Home From the Klondike With \$20,000 to His Credit.

L. D. Carle returned to his home in this city last Monday evening after having spent the past twenty months in the far famed Klondike country. Mr. Carle looks the picture of health and naturally enough is in the best of spirits, having averaged a clearing up of just one thousand dollars a month during his absence.

Soon after arriving in this city he deposited a sack containing 41 pounds of nuggets and gold dust at the First National Bank, which when properly displayed, fairly dazzled one's vision. This fine display of nuggets has been a source of great curiosity and interest to Mr. Carle's many friends since its deposit at the bank and has given many of our citizens a renewed attack of Klondike fever. Besides this gold dust Mr. Carle displayed about \$800 in drafts making a total of about \$20,000 to his credit.

Though no less genial, plain and unassuming as of yore we note that Mr. Carle now sports a glittering diamond ring and other valuable jewelry, manufactured from gold of his own digging and set with valuable stones, some of which was bought as gifts to his wife, daughter and grand child.

Mr. Carle has always born the reputation of being a ruster and his well deserved success in the Klondike is conclusive proof of his energy, thrift and enterprise. He left Gold in a point 16 miles from Dawson Sept. 30, making the trip in 15 days. In the same week party was included the Berry firmer, who brought out 2300 pounds of dirt. Mr. Carle says there is yet fortune to be made in that country but does not advocate any one to go there with any positive assurance of success.

He still retains valuable mining interests in the Klondike, but as yet is undecided in regard to returning to that country. He says a great transformation has been brought about there within the past two years. Good ore now prevails; all staple articles of merchandise can be purchased at comparatively reasonable rates; telegraphic communications is now afforded with the outside world and travel and transportation has been reduced to a minimum.

He reports Dr. Bradley, Attorney General J. E. Carter and other Roseburgers as prospering.

Mr. Carle made a pleasant call today and it was with much interest that we listened to his accounts of life in the Klondike. We congratulate Mr. Carle on his well deserved success and good fortune.

## Hosiery Bargains

Satisfied With Hop Crop.

George J. Stearns, a prominent hop raiser of the Clatsop, is registered at the Park. He expressed himself as satisfied with the crop and prospect for prices in 1900, though nearly one-fourth of his hops was left unpecked on account of the cold.

He saved 25,000 pounds in first-class shape, however, and 12,000 pounds he had already contracted to sell to Albany men, at 12 cents. Hop-baling has not begun in Douglas county, and he does not consider the hop market fairly opened yet. Baling has been delayed on account of the difficulty in obtaining hop cloth, but the product of his fields is safely housed in good sheds provided for the purpose, and baling can proceed at his leisure.—Oregonian.
