The PLAINDEALER trusts there will be many happy family reunions in old Douglas today.

The people of the great Umpqua valley have a great deal to be thankful for when they sum up the blessings of the year over their Thanksgiving turkey to day. They have been blessed with abundant harvests, and no devastating floods or withering droughts have visited their favored land. With very few exceptions, all the products of the farm, forest and shop, have brought remunerative prices. There has been and is, remunerative employment for every class of labor and every class of our citizens have more money to spend than for many previous years. The indebtedness of our people has been very materially decreased and the man who would have the temerity to assert that the people of Douglas county are not a happy and prosperous people with much to be thankful for is either blind to the truth or wilfully perverts the facts.

The democratic newspapers of the state are rolling under their tongues as a sweet morsel an alleged receipt purporting to have been given by Governor Geer to one Plummer for \$1000, the consideration being that if Geer was elected Plummer was to be superintendent of the penitentiary. It is further stated that when the appointment was not made the money was paid back and \$1000 additional as damages. It is fair to presume that no such receipt is in existence. They have undertaken to prove too much. If the receipt had been given the governor would at least have been able to take it up when he paid the money back. The governor is not a fool, nor is Plummer an adventurer. He might not be a man who would do that that is capable of uttering a forged document? Disappointed candidates sometimes do and say dreadful things.—Forest Grove Times.

The Roseburg Review publishes the statement, which may be true and may not, that the anti-republican forces in Kansas, succeeded in defeating every soldier boy that was nominated for a county office, in that state, by the republicans, 20 in all. We do not see, looking at it from our standpoint, that there is anything in the statement to be proud of. The statement, if true, shows among other things that volunteers who served their country either in Cuba or Luzon, most look to the republicans for political recognition, if they are to receive any, and that they will have the bitter opposition of a large part of the anti-republican forces. We may large part, because we are sure that the rabid and bitterly partisan leaders of the fusion forces can not whip their followers into the line in opposition to the just recognition of the soldier boys. At least the statement of the Review may be taken as a warning to the soldier boys of Douglas county as to the fight they may expect: is this country, from that origin if any of them should dare to accept a position on the republican ticket at the coming election.

Speaking of the silly story now going the rounds of the demo-prop press of the state, in which it is intimated that Governor Geer accepted \$1000 or some other amount, from some mythical individual in Polk county or some other place, the Pendleton East Oregonian says:

One thing is certain, Governor Geer owes it to the people who supported him at the polls and who have believed in him since, to deny the story point blank through the press, or to resign his office without delay.

Don't you allow this matter to keep you awake nights, neighbors. Try to suppress your hypocritical walls. The people who supported Gov. Geer at the polls are not carrying out this matter, nor have they lost any of their faith in his honor or integrity. It is the fellows who didn't support him at the polls, who have always slandered and maligned him on every occasion, who are eternally looking for something to find fault with, who are shedding hypocritical tears over this matter. Not a single decent man of any party, who loves justice and right, and hates a despicable, black-mailing, slanderous cur, believes in this story, or believes that Gov. Geer gave it a moment's thought or a word of explanation.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.

An act of the Oregon legislative assembly, approved February 18, 1899, made it the duty of the governor of the state to cause five proposed amendments to the state constitution, therein scheduled and designated, "to be published without delay for five consecutive weeks in one newspaper published in each judicial district of the state, such newspaper to be designated by the governor." Pursuant to the act's direction, Governor Geer has designated the PLAINDEALER as the paper in this judicial district in which said proposed amendments are to be published, and we therefore begin said publication in last Monday's issue.

The first of these amendments, which was proposed by the legislature of 1893, and agreed to by the legislature of 1895, is designated in the subdivision act as "municipal indebtedness, unimproved," and is designed to prohibit any municipal corporation or school district from incurring an indebtedness, including existing indebtedness, to exceed 5 per centum of the value of its taxable property for state and county taxes. It is an amendment to section 10, article XI, and seems in the judgment of the legislature to be necessary because of the disposition of town and school corporations to go recklessly into debt.

The second amendment, which was likewise proposed in 1893 and agreed to in 1895, is designated as the "Judiciary amendment," and its purpose is to increase the number of the justices of the supreme court from three to five. It is an amendment to section 10, article VII. If it shall carry, it will be the duty of the governor to appoint two additional justices of the supreme court, to hold office until the next general election there, after in 1902.

The third amendment, which was also proposed in 1893 and agreed to in 1895, is designated as "irrigation amendment," and is designed to grant right of eminent domain to irrigation and drainage companies, subject to section 18, article I, of the state constitution, in reference to the appropriation of and compensation of private property taken for public use.

The necessary use of lands for reservoirs, canals, ditches, flumes, etc., is declared to be a "public use," as is the appropriation of waters for "sale, rental or distribution, subject to regulation and control by the state;" while the "right to collect taxes or compensation for the use of water" is declared to be a "franchise," which "cannot be exercised except by authority of and in a manner prescribed by law." The amendment is an addition to the constitution, to be designated article XIX.

The fourth amendment, also proposed in 1893 and agreed to in 1895, is merely the repeal of section 35 of article I, prohibiting the immigration of free negroes to the state of Oregon, which has been a dead letter since July 21, 1868, having been rendered void by the fourteenth amendment to the United States constitution. In the act of 1899 it is designated as the "repealing amendment," and its purpose is merely to expunge the organic law. The effect of a favorable vote will be to cut out an obsolete section, whose retention is merely a reminder of the struggle incident to the overthrow of slavery, and the determination of Oregon pioneers to keep the negro question "under cover."

The fifth amendment, proposed in 1893 and agreed to in 1899, proposes that in Oregon "the elective franchise shall not hereafter be prohibited to any citizen on account of sex," and is designated as the "equal-suffrage amendment."

All the amendments will be submitted to the voters next year, pursuant to the provisions of the constitution and the act of February 18, 1899, in such form as to afford the voter ready knowledge of the nature of the amendments proposed, and after each of the five will be the words "Yes" and "No." The voter, by casting of one or the other, or of both or neither, can instantly record his preference. A majority of the vote cast on any amendment is sufficient to carry it.

ROUNDING UP REBELS

Troops on the Trail of the Few Remaining Bands

THE PURSUIT OF AGUINALDO

General Otis Cables That He is Heading for Bangued, an Inland Town East of Vigan.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—General Otis today reports the following dispatch to the Philippines in the following dispatch to the war department:

"Manila, Nov. 27.—Steamer from San Fabian yesterday brought 115 Spanish prisoners, \$75,000 insurgent government money, and other property captured by Lawton's troops near Yagui, the 25th.

"Wharton's troops and Fowler's company of the Thirty-third drove the enemy westward from Mangalena, a few miles southwest of Dagupan, and captured five 3-inch muzzle-loading guns, 12 rifles, 20,000 rounds of Maxim cartridges, 1000 shrapnel, 800 pounds of powder and other property; also 94 Spanish and seven American prisoners.

"Bell, with the Thirty-sixth infantry is in pursuit, and will march down the western Luzon coast. Indications are that two or three bodies of insurgent troops, numbering probably 500 or more men each, in the mountain west of the railroad, can be readily handled by MacArthur. They have the bulk of the insurgent artillery, all of which will be captured, unless barred.

"Young is still in pursuit of Aguinaldo who is heading for Bangued, a few miles east of Vigan; Young, with cavalry and scouts, is followed by a battalion of the Thirty-third and the rest of the battalion of the Twenty-second, and two battalions of the Thirty-first are en route for Vigan by the military post road. Young's reception by the inhabitants is enthusiastic, they giving all the assistance possible. Aguinaldo has collected more than 1000 of his troops at the north. Probably most of them will desert him.

"A number of small detachments of insurgent troops throughout the country north of Manila have been captured, and the inhabitants manifest gratitude for their deliverance. Indications are that the insurgent forces south of Manila are disintegrating, and the troops are going to their homes.

"Reports from the southern islands are favorable. Zamboanga insurgents surrendered to our troops, and no trouble is anticipated there."

Oregon Lands Flarries at Vigan.

Later in the day the following dispatch was received from General Otis:

"Oregon landed marines at Vigan yesterday. Young's column was at Nampagan, 20 miles north of San Fernando, on the 25th, from which point it passed north into the mountains. Troops were relieved the marines at Vigan on the 26th. The bulk of the Spanish and American prisoners are reported at Bangued, 20 miles east of Vigan.

"Wharton, at San Fabian, just reports the capture of 73 more rifles, \$1100 in money, and also that he has been obliged to take the mother and son of Aguinaldo under guard at San Fabian, to prevent their murder by natives. They will be sent here at the first opportunity and delivered to friends. Natives in the vicinity of Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya, are offering their services to drive out the insurgents there.

"Reports from Zamboanga say the insurgents surrendered heavy artillery to the army, and since have surrendered to Nichols, commanding the battalion of the Twenty-third infantry, 170 rifles, one Nordenfiedt, and four breech-loading cannons. Order is restored in the town and vicinity. About 80 Tagals are scattered in the mountains."

A DOUBTFUL VICTORY

Nearly Two Hundred British Killed.

THE NINTH LANCERS MISSING

Stories of Burglars Rapid Retirement Must Be Received With Caution.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—A dispatch has been received here from General Buller giving a list of casualties among the troops engaged in the battle of Graepan, but which is not officially designated as the battle of Istan. It proves, as was anticipated, that the British success was heavily bought. The losses announced today, added to the naval brigade casualties previously notified, make a grand total of 195, as the cost of General Methuen's second battle.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—In General Methuen's engagement with the Boers at Istan, the Yorkshires apparently bore with the naval brigade, the brunt of the fighting, as there were in addition to three officers, 45 of the rank and file killed, wounded and missing. The fact that the list contained the casualties of the Ninth Lancers seems to dispose of the fears that the cavalry was surrounded and captured, especially as none of the lancers are reported missing.

General Buller's list of casualties shows that among the wounded of the Second Yorkshires light infantry were Captain Yates, Lieutenant Fernehouph and Lieutenant Ackrold.

The casualties among the noncommissioned officers and men of various regiments engaged were: Killed, 10; wounded, 71; missing, 9.

The war office has also received the following dispatch from General Buller: "Our last news from Ladysmith on November 21, said all were well."

Buller also reports: "Casualties in the reconnoissance of the armored train November 24 were:

Killed—Lieutenant Lewis, Bombay infantry; one private. Wounded 1. In the reconnoissance of November 26, Ninth Lancers wounded: Lieutenant Sterling and one trooper.

"A corrected list of the British casualties at Graepan shows that Flag Captain Prothero, of the Dorris, and Lieutenant of Marines Jones, also of the Dorris, previously reported wounded were killed."

The additional casualties telegraphed by Buller appear to be the first intimations of actions of General Methuen's forces have not yet been reported. Apparently the government is monopolizing the single cable working to South Africa, as up to 2 o'clock this afternoon no news from the seat of war was made public, with the exception of Buller's dispatches.

This is particularly tantalizing at the present crucial moment.

While the latest news is of a fairly reassuring character from the British point of view, much of it is assumed to be true on insufficient evidence. For instance, the reported capture of Honey Nest Kloof of which there is no confirmation, while stories of the rapid retirement of Boers in Natal must be received with caution. The fact appears to be that the British scouts have lost touch of the burghers, portions of whose force, after withdrawing out of reach of observers, may, it is claimed, make a detour with the object of interrupting the British line of communication.

Sharp fighting may be expected at any time on the southern frontier. Possibly General Gatacre's first battle will be in the rough passes of the Stormberg mountains.

It is said the French cabinet has instructed the minister of war to release all officers leave to go abroad, and that officers absenting themselves in order to go to the Transvaal will do so at the risk of dismissal.

SUCCESSFUL SUGAR RUN.

Season's Work at La Grande Closed—Product 3,000,000 Pounds.

The sugar factory has closed down, after a somewhat irregular run of from 45 to 55 days. It is somewhat difficult to estimate the exact length of the run, as there were many stops, due to the inability to turn beets; but the fires were going at least 55 days. The work of cutting beets was completed several days ago, but about 30 men have been retained to work the brown sugar and clean out the factory. Five or six, in fact, will remain all winter. Those who were discharged were paid in full, including 10 per cent additional promised them for next month. Some of them went to Utah, their fares being paid by the railway company, and others went to Waverly, Wash., where the new factory is just opening the season's run. The payroll for this month was not less than \$30,000.

It is estimated that about 18,000 tons of beets were used. The sugar from this amount was about 3,000,000 pounds. In the process of converting beets into sugar, over 3000 cords of wood were used.

The season's run is considered by both growers and factory men as a very successful one, in spite of an unfavorable season.
