A Few Philippine Comments.

EDITOR PLAINDEALER: Some people there are who seem to know nothing, nowadays, of anti-expansion, when in reality I believe that it would stop to think (in they ever do think) and then study the past history of the United States, they would find that the whole history, from '76 down, has been one of expansion. If it is not expansion, then pray tell the people what expansion is.

Let us for a few moments revert to plain, incontrovertible fact, and look into the past record.
In 1783 Great Britain acknowledged the complete independence of the United States, and surrendered to our forces all of her territory that lay east of the Mississippi river, and north to the lakes, Canada and Nova Scotia, Florida being under Spain. That was the size of our territory until Jefferson took the presidential chair, when he, in the name of the democratic party and the party that today cries out against such a policy, went so far as to make the purchase of Louisiana from France, in April 1803.

Question.—Did or did not that expand our possessions?
During Monroe's administration, during that "era of good feeling," our territory was once more expanded, for Monroe then purchased Florida from Spain, in 1819.

Following the events of time on down, we come to Tyler's administration, and here in history we find recorded the annexation to the United States, in 1845, another acquisition of territory, though, possibly not expansion. We all know that this act was followed by the "War with Mexico," in which we gained all of the vast territory known as the "Mexican Cession," a very valuable tract of land. This was not the end of the Mexican trouble, for in 1845 we did that another tract was taken from Mexico, known as the "Gadsden Purchase." Only a few more square miles added, but we are told that this is not expansion.

Then in 1867 we find the United States, a government that always opposed expansion, by the way, purchased from Russia the vast territory of Alaska, that is attracting such world-wide attention today, on account of her extensive gold fields.
Then again, this anti-expansion country of ours gets a hold on the Samoan islands.

Coming on down, every fifteen year old child remembers the first of the "Hawaii troubles," and how the democratic party kicked and bucked around, and Grover Cleveland's actions in regard to same, and how in 1898 the whole group of islands were annexed to this great republic of ours.
Now if you please, we will look at the case of our present position.
This great and grand anti-expansion party of ours howled and brayed around because President McKinley was a little slow in declaring war immediately after the "Maui disaster." But we were finally plunged into the depths of war, and all went to fighting. We whipped Spain, and acquired the territory of the Philippines, part of the Carolines and Porto Rico. Nothing has been said in regard to getting Porto Rico, that was all right.

Then we went to take formal possession of the Philippines and the doughy little Filipinos by the way.
Here we see the Americans have gotten the islands by doing two things, capturing the Spanish fleet and the city next, and when we made the treaty with Spain, we lawfully became the possessors of the conquered Philippines.
Now because we have come possessors of the islands, and the semi-civilized contingent of that country does not see fit to come under American rule, why these "anti" say "Get off the island and let them enjoy their liberty." We did not know that they ever had their liberty, but if they wish to enjoy liberty, how can they enjoy it more than to become American subjects, and have the same rights that we, as citizens, do enjoy today?

Of all things that a true, patriotic citizen of these United States may do, he will not encourage a foreign foe, and when he does so, it is my earnest belief that such is not his real sentiment, but simply the mechanism of politics, and what ever his political boss says, which is always in opposition to his opponent's belief, he must follow.

BOHEMIA NOTES.

A General Write-up of the Camp—Continued From Week to Week.

(Bohemia Nugget.)
Above the German lies the famous Anaconda out of which are assaying high in the thousands has been struck. This mine is owned by Thos. Johnson, one of the old time prospectors and miners of the district, whose home is in Cottage Grove.

At present there is a controversy pending as to right of title, but notwithstanding operations are going steadily on. The property is considered one of the best in the district.
Just below the Musick on the ridge, lies several other mines of lesser note in the matter of development, but giving excellent prospects. The first is owned by Peterson & Cliney, who are doing a large amount of fine work. Then comes the Golden Slipper group owned by Seattle men and represented by Mr. Worley who is going after his work in a business like manner.
Below is the Wall Street group owned by Portland men. There is a vast amount of work done here and some very fine free gold specimens have been taken from this mine.

James Sears' fine group lies just below the Wall Street on which he has been continuously working during the entire season, and has a fine showing which bids fair to become a great billion producer. Lower down on City Creek are a number of other promising claims. At the mouth of City Creek is the Riverside Gold Mine & Milling Company's rich property which has been undergoing extensive development with flattering results.
The Calapoolia is a short distance above Riverside. This is an incorporated company of Eugene business men who are represented here by B. E. Hawley who is showing his company a mine to none on the coast.

Space will not admit of a general description of the thousand and one claims on Monte Rico Ridge, suffice it to say they are all good. Old Bohemia contains is spotted with camps and cabins of the hardy prospectors.
At Glenwood on the line of the Cottage Grove stage line are some fine mines. One group being owned by Hinds & Co., which is a promising showing. Mr. Hinds has good cabins and wood sheds and is fixed for work the entire year, with timber and water in abundance.
White Bros. & Co., own another group at Glenwood that bids fair to rival some of the best in camp. They have a good deep tunnel on their mine with a good strong vein of ore at a value of \$15 per ton, and many others in this locality to numerous to mention. Down this creek and at the junction of Martin Creek are some good mines as can be found in the district. Foremost is Jenks' mines equipped with an arasta and ample water power for Chicago electric light systems. There are 5 claims in this group in a phenolic dyke of vast richness. Mr. Jenks has been pushing work steadily for about 18 months and all in good ore. Anywhere on the main side below this main ledge one gets a good prospect from the surface.
Up Martin Creek are some very fine prospects. Foremost is the Star owned by Jennings Bros., who have a 5 stamp mill besides other improvements. Jennings Bros. are extensively engaged in mining and have been great factors in the up building of the camp.

The Combination is also on this creek owned by Roseburg business men, who have done a large amount of good work in the last 2 years.
Over John the Adams mountain side of camp, there has recently been some rich discoveries, but only a small amount of work so far.
