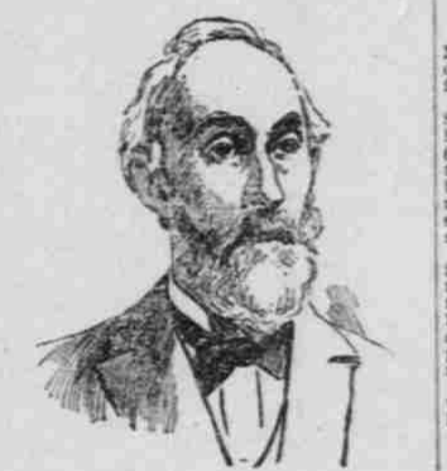

REV. DR. DOANE.

Rev. N. Doane, D. D., Dean of the Theological School of the Portland University, Celebrated His Golden Wedding Last September.

This worthy man has been at the head of Methodist church work in the Northwest for 46 years. He had a double reason to be congratulated on this occasion as he had been almost totally deaf for years, and in spite of his advanced age,
