A county convention of the republican voters of Douglas county, Oregon, is hereby called to meet at the Court House in Roseburg, Oregon, at 10 o'clock a. m. on Thursday April 5th, 1900, for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention which meets at Portland, Or. April 12, 1900, and delegates to the Congressional Convention which meets at McMinnville, Oregon, on April 17, 1900, and to nominate candidates for the various county offices to be voted for at the coming June election.

The primaries will be held in the respective precincts on Saturday March 31. The apportionment for said convention shall be 11 delegates at large for each precinct and 15 delegates for each 15 votes or fraction thereof of 15 votes cast for Hon. T. T. Geer for governor at the state election of 1898, as follows, to-wit:

It is recommended that the voters of each precinct, nominate a candidate for road supervisor, for each road district in their precinct, as well as candidates for justice of the peace and constable, and certify their names to the convention for ratification. It is requested that the voters of each precinct elect one person to serve as a member of the County Central Committee, and that that person attend the County Convention for the purpose of meeting with the committee at its organization. It is further recommended that in the precincts of Roseburg, West Roseburg, Unappqua, Deer Creek, Oakland and Calapooia the polls be opened at 10 o'clock p. m. and that in all other precincts the primaries be called to order at 2 o'clock p. m. and remain open as long as there is a chance for a ticket proper.

The third and last term of the school year of the Roseburg Academy opened today. The work so far this year has been of the very best, and shows Prof. Whittlesey to be not only a first-class teacher but a gentleman in every sense of the word. It would be of incalculable benefit to the people of Roseburg and Douglas county if this school could be made a permanent institution.

Hon. S. L. Moorehead, editor of the Junction City Times, spent a few days in Roseburg last week, as a witness in the circuit court. Mr. Moorehead is quite prominently mentioned as a candidate for joint senator for the counties of Lane, Douglas and Josephine, and we believe that Lane county should present the name of Mr. Moorehead to the convention it would meet with the hearty approval of the republicans of Douglas county.

One of the great and lasting benefits which would not doubt follow the establishment of creameries at various points in this county, would be the interest which would be aroused among the farmers of the county in favor of good roads. Hereafter the farmers have been able to do all their freighting to the railroad during the period of good roads. Almost all the farm products have been either marketed or stored in the warehouses before the fall rains set in and under the roads impossible. One of the most serious obstacles to the creamery business at points like Roseburg, for instance, will be the fact that during parts of the year, the roads are in a very bad condition for even light wagons, and any industry which will promote the building of good roads leading into the market town would be one of the greatest benefits to the country that could be inaugurated.

S. P. Relief Association.

We understand that quite little opposition is being manifested, on the part of the employees of the S. P. Company, to the new relief and insurance scheme which the company has set on foot for the benefit of the employees. While membership in the relief association is declared to be optional, yet the employees of the company, with the exception of some few, seem to have accepted the plan. It is to be expected that the company will be able to secure the cooperation of the employees to the relief association. One of the principal objections to the "scheme," is that while the expense is considerable, it provides for its members, no compensation for injury or death caused by accident or sickness, not a direct result of the service of the company. It is therefore, it is said necessary for the employee, to carry an additional insurance in order for him to have complete protection. There are also other objections. The matter will no doubt be arranged so as to give more general satisfaction. The company have issued the following circular letter in regard to the claim that members would be found by the company to force the old employees to join the association.

San Francisco, March 7, 1900. To All Superintendents: The information reaches me that many employers, believing membership in the relief department compulsory, while others believe whilst not compulsory at present, the regulations will be changed hereafter so as to make it so. As the instructions from the president of the company were that the membership as to present employees was to be entirely voluntary, I wish to assure your men that of neither now nor hereafter will any form of coercion be permitted to be used, and no employee by not joining will in the least degree prejudice his standing or compromise his position with the company. Dr. E. V. Hoover. The latest number of the Oregon Native Son, published in Portland, contains a very good photograph of Dr. E. V. Hoover, of this city, and the following biographical sketch: The subject of this sketch, Dr. E. V. Hoover, is one of the native sons whom Oregon has as just right to be proud of. Dr. Hoover, although young in years, is recognized as a thorough master of his chosen profession and one of the leading physicians and surgeons of Southern Oregon. Dr. Hoover is a son of the late Dr. W. Hoover, an Oregon pioneer, and was born in Roseburg, Or., August 11, 1873. He received his early education in the public and high schools. The doctor always evinced a desire to become a physician, and at the early age of 15 years he began the study of medicine at Roseburg under local doctors. In 1894 he went to Portland, where he attended the Oregon State Medical College for one year and from this institution he entered the leading medical college of the West, the college of Physicians and Surgeons at St. Louis, at which college, by careful and painstaking study he graduated in March, 1897. The doctor in addition to his studies at this college, took a special course in obstetrics and also in theoretical and practical bacteriology, the certificates for these special franchises of medicine he now holds. On April 8th, 1897, the doctor passed the examination of the State Medical Board and was granted a license and at once opened an office and commenced practicing at Roseburg. Almost from the start his success has been phenomenal and it was but a short time until he was doing the leading practice in Douglas county. It might be said that Dr. Hoover's success has been largely due to his own efforts in never missing a chance to add to his store of medical knowledge; his desire to aid himself of all the latest methods of treating disease and the close attention which he has given to his profession. Dr. Hoover is a prominent member and is also the medical examiner for a number of fraternal and beneficiary orders, among them being the Odd Fellows and the auxiliary, the Elks, Woodmen of the World, Order of Pendo, Workmen, and also a member of the Oregon State Medical Society. Dr. Hoover was elected corner of Douglas county in 1898, and has been discharged the duties of the office with credit to himself and has given entire satisfaction to his constituents and has saved the county much needless expense. He is also the present county physician. Dr. G. W. Hoover, father of the doctor, died October 12, 1886. He was one of the pioneer physicians of this state. He was born near Booneville, Mo., in 1822, and crossed the plains with an ox team, arriving in Roseburg, Or., in 1853, where he practiced his profession continuously for over 28 years. Dr. Hoover was celebrated for his erudition in medicine, and for the close attention which he gave his profession, and always expressed the desire that his son should follow his footsteps and make provisions that he might do so. The doctor's mother is still alive and lives in Roseburg, where she enjoys the respect of all who know her.
