The building, equipping, maintaining and operating of a railroad from the month of Daniel's Creek, on Coos Bay, to a point at Reseburg, Douglas County ; the building of steamers, telephone and telegraph lines, and the carrying on of a general merchandise business. The principal office or place of business will be at North Bend. The capital stock is placed at \$100,000, divided into 1000 shares. The incorporators are: L J. Simpson, W. H. Kriebel and T. B. Carey.

The main purpose of the corporation is to engage in logging on Danier's Creek. They alread ave a force of 150 men building the road, which will tap one of the finest balles of timber on the Pacific Coast.


