Edward W. Riddle was in town Saturday and reports the prune crop of the Cow Creek valley almost a total failure owing to the late heavy frosts. Owing to a like failure last year the fruit growers of that section are naturally considerably discouraged.

The Southern Pacific Company will construct a trestle twenty-five miles long, which is several miles longer than any other trestle in the world. The trestle will cross the northern end of the Great Salt Lake and will shorten the distance to Ogden and consequently decrease the traveling time.

One of the largest freight trains that that has been seen in Roseburg for some time was No. 221 on last Friday. It consisted of 29 loaded cars, one empty, and the caboose, taking four engines to draw it, three of which were on the head end and one used as a "pusher" between the last car and caboose.

It is reported that the Northern Pacific Railroad Company have filed scrip on over 40,000 acres of land in Douglas and Lane counties, and have filed 50 contests against timber applications in Lane. Over 600 applications for land patents have been filed in the United States land office in Roseburg since January 1—Ashland Tidings.

Certificates Must Be Stamped.

The attention of candidates who are filing their certificates of nomination is called to the fact that these certificates require an internal revenue stamp. It seems that all candidate have not kept this in mind. The Republican State Central Committee desires to impress upon all candidates on their ticket that the law must not be disregarded. What the results would be has not been determined. It is unlikely that a man's election election would be impaired, but it is quite certain that a candidate failing to use the requisite stamp would be subjecting himself to the penalty for violating the law. The shortest way out of the difficulty is to stamp the certificate before filing it.
