I suppose the "Fisher" refers to, and makes a villainous attempt to cast a stigma upon Mr. H. J. Wilson, who was unjustly and harshly turned down by the democrats for county commissioner after the resignation of Mr. Byron (populist). Since the "Fisher" has purposely attacked earnest and conscientious populist citizens, I will ask their indulgence for a few minutes that this matter may be properly and truthfully explained and the fact ascertained as to who was the "union" party that turned Mr. Wilson down. As the most of you know Mr. Wilson is an earnest, hard working populist and a man well fitted and qualified to fill the position to which he aspired and of which he was well deserving. That the county court might be relieved of the responsibility of arbitrarily choosing a successor to Mr. Byron, Mr. Wilson with the assistance of his friends went before the people with a petition and as a result of their efforts secured about 250 earnest petitioners from all political parties. Mr. Wilson, favored his appointment. But Judge Lyons, a democrat, who owes his election to the populists and, presumably with the consent and direction of the "Fisher" and other leading democrats, arbitrarily ignored Mr. Wilson's petition and the wishes of the people whose names appeared thereon, and ignoring the two parties, arbitrarily turned down a good substantial citizen and an earnest, sincere populist who is well fitted for the place. This explains why a successor has not been appointed to Mr. Byron.

We did not care to tramp up this old sore had not the "Fisher" willfully and maliciously tried to bring contempt and ridicule upon us good and honest law-abiding citizens and populists as are found anywhere, and who, without question stand far ahead of the "Fisher" on any score. Why he, the "Fisher," should willfully and maliciously attack and make vicious and false statements against honorable citizens is beyond my comprehension.
