Speaking of Roseburg's recent street fair and carnival the Grants Pass Observer says: "Roseburg's fair was a grand success from all reports, and was an occasion of pleasure to both the citizens and visitors from the outside. It has given that city desirable advertising that will result in substantial benefit. The time has come for Grants Pass to have a street fair and carnival, and this matter should receive the attention of our citizens early next year."

Don't worry and rail about the making of the "yellow newspaper." Not so is the evil to be minimized. The yellow journal is not in the maker of the paper, but in the readers. The maker merely caters to a demand, more or less general. The remedy against the "yellow newspaper" lies in improvement of the public conscience, in broader general culture, in refinement of the popular taste; and the work must go on till such journals shall no longer be wanted. Then the country will be rid of the yellow journal. Not till then. The yellow journal is an effect not a cause. Rid the country of the cause and the effect will cease, at once. Bring up the mental and moral standard, improve and refine the public taste, get rid of the intellectual perverts, push true culture on all lines, and the time will come when the yellow journal, no longer in demand, no longer will affront the light.—Oregonian.

It is rather surprising that the editor of the Oregonian should commit himself as he did in the above singular reference to "Yellow Journalism." His theory that the makers of the papers are the readers is undoubtedly an hallucination.

Why does he claim at other times that newspapers are the educators of the people which is true and a substantive assertion. It is not to be presumed that any attempt to degrade, either a nation or its people, must, or should be catered to by the press. The higher the standard of the press in a moral and patriotic sense, the better the people. The Oregonian owes its popularity to its splendid management in that line. Its editorial management, and in fact nearly always, are written with great care and evidently emanate from a thoughtful mind, and its readers whether they agree with it or not, recognize its ability and worth and in the line of general news, the manner in which it reports the most atrocious crimes does not debase the mind by a perusal of its columns. Yellow Journalism, like all things of that nature attract and may interest, but does not elevate; the natural tendency of the mind, we might say, make things of that nature acceptable and if followed up, sought after. The theory of the Oregonian is to keep supplying that which will lower and debase the intellect. To bring up the mental and moral standard and improve and refine the public taste, should be the one great effort and object of the press, and at the same time encourage a desire for a higher standard of literature. Suppose every paper and magazine were a "yellow journal" and the youth of our nation mentally fed with that kind of literature, what would be the result? The answer is apparent. It matters not to what we attribute the higher and better nature of man or what religion we teach, we must admit that there is a higher standard, and that in order to reach that the mind must be brought up to that standard by education; and the higher the standard the better the person, the more refined the society and the more patriotic the nation. Because a child begs for that which would dwarf it physically is no argument that it should be so fed, neither should that which has a tendency to lower and debase the mind be supplied because it is relished. "No man liveth unto himself." Then let the aim of journalism be, not to cater to that which is hurtful to our better natures, but to build up and elevate mankind.

OREGON'S GREATEST NEEDS.

Comparison With California Respecting Taxation and Wages.

A former Oregonian now residing in California draws some significant comparisons between that state and this showing wherein California forces ahead so much more rapid than this state. He says in part: "I think what Oregon wants is capital, not people. The laws of Oregon keep capital out of the State. Outside of Portland, no man could successfully engage in any business requiring any amount of capital, such as manufacturing, and compete with other states."

"There are several reasons for this, but the first and foremost one is the low valuation on property, and consequently high tax levy. As an example, compare this county in California, Del Norte, with Polk county, in Oregon. The annual income from taxes is about the same, namely, \$45,000. In this county, in California, the total tax levy is 2 per cent, or 20 mills, while in Polk county it is about 44 mills. If a man deposited \$50,000 in a Del Norte county bank, his taxes would be \$1000; and for the same amount in a Polk county bank it would be \$2200, which is quite a difference in favor of keeping the money in California."

"There is another significant fact. Del Norte county has only about 2600 people, and Polk county has nearly 10,000. Yet, in a low levy, nearly the same amount of money is raised. Polk county is about \$70,000 in debt, and Del Norte county warrants are cashed upon presentation. Take the matter of school teachers. About 20 miles north of here, an Oregon teacher has 21 pupils and is paid \$35 a month for teaching a seven month school; while on this side of the line a young lady from Berkeley teaches 12 pupils and receives \$90 a month for a 10 month school. The consequence is that teachers here keep the same school year after year, while in Oregon they constantly change."

"There is no exemption here of \$300 for a householder, as in Oregon, which is a farce; consequently every one pays some taxes. Comparing Oregon and Washington and California, reminds me of Ireland as compared with England; it is strictly an agricultural country, because no capital can profitably be invested in any thing else. I am not far from the Oregon line, and yet I see things of every day that are really different and I blame it all to the element in Oregon which cannot see that if one man has property worth \$50,000, in real estate and another has property worth \$50,000 in money, that it is simply driving money out of the state for investment if the real estate is taxed as being worth \$10,000 only, and the money at its face value. The natural resources of Oregon are as great as California, but capital and labor must work together to achieve any great results, and in Oregon labor must set alone, under present conditions. What Oregon wants is to treat money and real estate the same when taxed; then her resources can be developed."

"The man who works on a salary in the one who succeeds best in Oregon, but salaries are entirely too low. The lowest wages paid here in a saw mill are \$45 a month, and for the same man in Oregon it is \$10 less a month. There is plenty of work here, and in Oregon it is hard to get a steady job."

October Weather.

The following data, covering a period of 24 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Roseburg, Oregon.

Mean or normal temperature, 53 deg. The warmest month was that of 1891, with an average of 55.5 deg. The coldest month was that of 1881, with an average of 48 deg. The highest temperature 91 deg. on 2nd 1885. The lowest temperature was 22 deg. on 14th, 1881.

Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in autumn, Oct. 11. Averaged date on which last "killing" frost occurred in spring, May 3. Precipitation (rain and melted snow.) Average for the month 2.84 inches. Average number of days with 30 in. or more, 12. The greatest monthly precipitation was 5.96 inches in 1881. The least precipitation was .00 inches in 1895. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 1.48 inches on 29th, 1888.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER.
Average number clear days, 9; partly cloudy days, 15; cloudy days, 9.

WIND.
The prevailing winds have been from the North and West. The highest velocity of the wind was 28 miles from the S. W. on 11th, 1879. Frost, Gusts, Wind, Clear, etc., Roseburg, Oregon. Date of issue, Sept. 24, 1901.

Doctors Were in Error.

Much discussion has occurred over the apparent lack of knowledge possessed by the eminent physicians who attended President McKinley, regarding the seriousness of the case.

In brief, the official report put the doctors on record as having affirmed the fact positive that the kidneys and stomach had not been injured, that there was no trace of blood poisoning, that the bullet wounds had healed nicely, and their patient was out of danger. At the same time Dr. McIlwaine and his associates have out the misinformation that "the holes in the president's stomach proper caused by the perforation of the bullet are now considered healed." And from this it is concluded that the physicians gave their patient a breakfast of chicken broth, toast and tea. But the autopsy proved them wrong in every assertion. It showed that part of the kidneys had been torn away by the bullet and also revealed the surprising fact "the tissue around each hole had become gangrenous," and the flesh along the course of the bullet was mortified over an area the size of a silver dollar. If medical science has made the heralded advances of which so much has been heard in the past decade, and if the president's physicians were men of the pre-eminent skill and learning attributed to them, what explanation will be offered for the remarkable difference between their diagnoses and their autopsy?

Death of Mrs. Fred Page-Tustin.

Mary J. Tustin, wife of Fred Page-Tustin, United States Commissioner, died at Wrangle, Alaska, September 23. She was a daughter of the late Captain A. G. Hembree, who was killed in the Yakima Indian war of 1856-6. She crossed the plains with her parents in 1857, being then about 4 years of age. Captain Hembree made his home in Yamhill county, Mr. and Mrs. Tustin were residents of Roseburg, Ore., when, in 1898, Mr. Tustin was appointed United States Commissioner at Wrangle. Mrs. Tustin left one son, Frank, aged about 16 years. Funeral services and burial was conducted at Seattle last Wednesday.

Mr. and Mrs. Page-Tustin were well and favorably known at this place where he was engaged in the practice of law for several years prior to his appointment to Alaska and the news of her death comes as a shock to the many Roseburg friends of the family who extend their heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved husband and son.

Encouraging Oil Prospects.

The Southern Oregon Oil Company's operations near Ashland are progressing very handsomely the last week, the drill going through the shale formation at a rapid rate and at 9 o'clock this morning a depth of 525 feet was reached with this noon they will be down 550 feet. The employees and visitors all feel very sanguine.

The Past Week an Oil Seepage was

unearthed by the drill and at each boring out of the mud and slush from the well the contents are covered with a film of oil that has every appearance of a mineral oil seepage. This is some evidence that underneath is an oil sandstone containing a good sized body of oil the pressure forcing it up into the shale formation. The Gageblum-Mack people are still prospecting the country south of town.—Ashland Record, Friday.

Hop Men Offered a Loan.

A proposition has been made to the officers of Oregon Hop Growers' Association to advance the growers a half million dollars for six months at a low rate of interest, which will be repaid to the board of directors called to meet at Salem October 5th, at 11 o'clock a.m. If the proposition meet the approval of the directors and is accepted by growers, it will enable the Oregon hop farmer to effectively combat the short sellers who are making efforts to bear the market in the face of a short crop of fine quality.—Salem Statesman

ROSEBURG IN OIL.

The Southern Oregon Oil Co.'s Plant Now Making Splendid Progress.

(Ashland Tidings.)

James Inman, of Looking Glass, Douglas county, who has been investigating the oil prospects of the vicinity of Ashland, left Saturday, for Kern county, Cal. where he will visit the McKittrick and Sunset districts.

Frank Anderson, the well-known geologist, and field assistant for Northern California for the State Mining Board, whose headquarters are now at Redding, was here, yesterday, and visited the drilling plant of the Southern Oregon Oil Co. He was much impressed with the excellent plan and the progress made thus far in the work.

The first testing plant of the Ashland Oil Co.—the Gageblum-Mack concern—at work on the E. L. Burton place south of town that is now working on a second hole near where its first drilling was done, has been having its share of difficulties and in operations Monday ran against some boulders that put the tools out of order for several hours. They were brought to town and repaired and work has been resumed.

The Southern Oregon Oil Co.'s drill, after several provoking interruptions through the breakage of tools, is again pounding furiously at its well on the Ashland place and driving through blue shale. Quite a number of visitors have been at the scene of the operations during the past few days and much surprise is expressed by all of them at the magnitude of the plant and the skill displayed by manager Foster and his crew in operating it. The oil seepages encountered during the past week are still dripping with the greasy liquid that delights the hearts of the workmen, and the tools come up out of the well streaked all over with it. At last accounts the drill had perforated the various strata encountered to a depth of 600 feet. This morning it is going through sand shale underneath a strata of blue shale—just the formation predicted by the experts and that which indicates final success in tapping the oil sands.

The Pacific Coast Oil Company, San Francisco District has paid over \$13,000,000 in dividends. The Blue Goose Company, whose first well sold for 10 cents a share, has paid over \$200,000 in dividends. The New York Oil Company sold its stock at 50 cents; it now commands \$200 per share. The Union Oil Company's stock sold at first at \$1 a share; this same stock now commands \$1500 a share. California desert oil lands, absolutely virgin as in the absence of oil and originally selling at from \$2 to \$5 per acre, now command \$5,000 to \$25,000 per acre, and hard to obtain at that figure. Many investors have made from \$50,000 to \$500,000 during the past year and some of the principal operators a great deal more.
