**PRUNES SAVED AT DILLARD.**—Nat Sebring, one of the operators of the Sebring prune drier, at Dillard, was in town Saturday and favored this office with a pleasant call. He says that his drier has cured about 60,000 pounds of first-class prunes this season and that very little fruit was destroyed by the rains in that vicinity, though B. C. Ago was doing a heavy loser at Civil Bend. Prune drying is nearing a close in this county, only about one week more being required to finish up the work. The crop has by no means been all saved, but, by far, the greater part of it is dried, and a fine looking lot of fruit it is. The need of more fruit driers was realized this year, regardless of the fact that many new ones were built this season. This will, to a great extent, be remedied by another year. The prune crop is of great benefit to our section, as it requires hundreds of hands to care for the same, and the pay role reaches thousands of dollars, besides the large amount of money realized from the sale of the prunes.

**HOME FROM NOME.**—S. S. Catching returned home from Cape Nome Saturday, where with his brother, Elmer and Lee he spent the summer working their claims which were located and developed last summer. The Messrs. Catching were pleased with their mining property and the result of their summer's work and will return and operate their mines again next season. Mrs. Catching returned to her husband in Portland and returned to this city with him. The brothers were passengers on the steamer Queen which recently made the record breaking run from Nome to Seattle in six days and fifteen hours. Elmer Catching stopped at his Washington home and Lee will remain at his Portland home during the winter.

He says prunedrying was nearly all completed in the Cow creek valley yesterday and that a good many prunes were lost as a result of the heavy rains in that valley. 
