SALEM, Nov. 11.—Governor Geer yesterday issued his Thanksgiving proclamation. It is as follows: "Although not yet passed from beneath the shadow of the great National tragedy which took from us the presence of our most beloved Chief Magistrate, we find reason for National thanksgiving in the unifying effect the great affliction has had upon the different sections of our common country, and the prospect of a continued era of good feeling. At no time within 50 years has party feeling been less bitter, or our country so harmonious in matters concerning its domestic welfare.

Late Tidings from Miss Stone. Boer War Will Continue. Bohemia Railroad Survey.

MISS STONE WELL CARED FOR. NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The Sofia correspondent of the Journal and Advertiser cables: Gregory Tsilka, Albanian missionary and husband of Mme. Tsilka, Miss Stone's companion in captivity, has arrived at Sofia. He said: "I have received a letter from my wife saying that Miss Stone and herself were well cared for. From the first they have known that liberation would not be speedy. The brigands are satisfied with their captures and are in no hurry. Frequently they get to eat something like bologna sausage. The letter also says that Miss Stone's active horseback life has enabled her to bear the brigand regime well. The words 'the earth, the earth' are written where the name of the place, when the letter came, should be, but the Turkish officials of Macedonia have had information about the captives right along. My wife intimates that they might be freed in the neighborhood of Salonica."

WAR MAY CONTINUE SIX MONTHS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—An interview with an Austrian merchant who just returned from South Africa is reported by the Vienna correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times. The merchant believes the war will last another six months, but does not think the Boers will hold out beyond next June. He believes they would be glad to make peace if obtained substantial autonomy. He says the British should not allow the burghers to retain the gold mine region which should be permanently under British rule.

THE BOHEMIA RAILROAD SURVEY.

COTTAGE GROVE, Nov. 16.—The survey party on the Cottage Grove and Bohemia railroad on Wednesday moved their camp from Bedrock to about two miles above Wildwood, near the Ben Pitcher place. About eighteen miles of the survey have now been completed. With the fine weather at hand work is being pushed with a vim. From now on progress will be somewhat slower as they get into the larger and thicker timber, but an increased force will to some extent offset that. So far things have moved along nicely and all is going well.

MR. SEHLBREDE EXONERATED.

United States Grand Jury at Skagway Says Charges Are Unfounded.

SKAGWAY, Nov. 5.—The United States grand jury, in its report today completely exonerated Commissioner C. A. Sehlbrede from the misconduct charged against him. The report said: "Referring to the alleged and rumored official misconduct of Commissioner C. A. Sehlbrede, we report that we have examined into every act which has been called to our attention, both by this court and the Department of Justice, as well as every rumor which has come to our knowledge, and have freely used the process of the court in securing the attendance of every witness reported to us as claiming to have any knowledge, as well as those who might be in a position to know of such alleged or rumored official misconduct or corruption, if any existed. And every opportunity has been given to those who have seemed anxious to establish such charges and rumors, and every effort has been earnestly and faithfully made by us to establish the truth or falsity of such charges and rumors, and after a full and complete investigation it is our conclusion that no official corruption or misconduct brought to our attention, or called to our attention by the news sheets and in the newspapers; but on the contrary find that his life has been honestly administered by him."

It is as follows: "Although not yet passed from beneath the shadow of the great National tragedy which took from us the presence of our most beloved Chief Magistrate, we find reason for National thanksgiving in the unifying effect the great affliction has had upon the different sections of our common country, and the prospect of a continued era of good feeling. At no time within 50 years has party feeling been less bitter, or our country so harmonious in matters concerning its domestic welfare. "Every department of our state government is performing the duties for which it was created, with promptness and fidelity; the hand of plenty has provided the necessities of life in abundance, among our people, all classes of whom are engaged in remunerative employment, and the name of our fair state in other sections of our great country is synonymous with steady progress and an assuredly prosperous future. "Recognizing in all these things the hand and head of an over-ruling Providence who doth all things well, and that a spirit of gratitude suggests an acknowledgment of the many favors enjoyed by us as a commonwealth, I hereby recommend, in conformity with the proclamation of the President of the United States, that Thursday, the 28th day of November, 1901, be observed as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, and that all our people on that day, while remembering the poor with appropriate gifts and cheerful words, divert from their usual vocations, and, in their usual places of worship, or elsewhere give praise to Almighty God, upon whom our fathers so firmly relied for National as well as individual guidance, for protection, and invoke the Divine aid along the pathway of National righteousness, as our country so eminently is doing position in power and influence among the Nations of the earth. "In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Oregon to be affixed, at the Capitol, in Salem, this 13th day of November, 1901. T. T. Oregon's exhibit is ready for the Charleston, S. C., exposition. The Yanbuhi county oil prospectors have ordered a drilling outfit and are going down for oil. At Toledo the oil well has reached a depth of about 100 feet and the indications for coal are good. The Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads are reported to have merged into one, and now the name shown is the Great Northern Pacific. The Oregon National Guard has received 1,000 Khaki uniforms which were ordered last summer and their old out-of-date blue Springfield rifles are to be replaced with the more modern Krag-Jorgensen. The Modera Workmen of the World are talking of erecting a two-story brick block in Ashland, and are now hunting an eligible location. There will be room for two stores on the ground floor and the lodge room will occupy the second story. L. J. Girouard, Government register in Dawson on Monday, according to a brief dispatch from the northern city.
