Anarchistic Shooting Galleries. Railroad Man Robbed. Pacific Cable Contract Let.

RULERS SHOT IN EFFIGY.

ROME, Nov. 20.—The police have closed a public shooting gallery in Rome and arrested the proprietors, who are accused of harboring anarchists. The shooting gallery had a set of figures at which the sportsmen aimed. Three of these represented Italian ministers, and the prize for hitting any of them was two chocolate creams. The other figures were those of the King of Italy, the Pope and President Roosevelt. The prizes for hitting these effigies were five chocolate creams. It was found that the shooting gallery became a meeting place for anarchists, who enjoyed shooting at the rulers.

RAILROAD MAN HELD UP.

JUNCTION CITY, Nov. 19.—S. D. Ralston, an employe of the Southern Pacific Co., on the pile driver train, was assaulted by an unknown party or parties about 3 o'clock this morning on the railroad track near the cattle guards. He had spent the evening with a number of other men of the crew at one of the saloons, and was under the influence of liquor, when with one of the men he started for the bunk car. When they reached the railroad track near the car, Ralston sat down on the track and would not go in the car to bed. His friend left him sitting there and went to bed. About 3 o'clock Ralston staggered into the car with blood all over his face, saying some one had sandbagged him and tried to kill him. Mr. Ottobek, superintendent of the train was called, and had the injured man taken to Dr. Lee's office where it was found that he had been hit across the forehead over the right eye with some blunt instrument, in all probability an iron coupling car pin. The skull was fractured badly and the bone over the right eye was broken. Dr. Lee assisted by Dr. Taggett, attended to the injured man's wounds. He will be sent to the S. P. Co.'s hospital at Portland on No. 15 train today.

ENGLISHMEN WILL LAY PACIFIC CABLE.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Commercial Pacific Cable Company, recently organized in New York to lay a cable from San Francisco to the Philippines, has awarded the contract for the manufacture and laying of the first section from San Francisco to Honolulu to an English company, which guarantees to complete it in ten months. The contract price is nearly \$600,000.
