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WILL MEET IN ROSEBURG

Republican Congressional Con- vention to be Held Here April First.

PORTLAND, Feb. 20.—April 1st, at 1 o'clock p. m., was the time fixed today for the first district republican congressional convention, and Roseburg was selected for the place.

The meeting of the first district congressional committee was held in the rooms of the republic in state central committee, chamber of commerce building, Dr. W. H. Harris, of Eugene, committee man from Lane county, presiding and C. B. Wier of Albany, ex officio clerk. Every county in the district, with the exception of Lincoln and Benton was represented. Dr. Harris held most of the proxies for the conventionmen present. Among those in attendance were Dr. T. W. Harris, Lane county; Dr. W. Tyler Smith, Yamhill county; Senator Percy Kelly, Lincoln county; ex Senator R. R. Porter, proxy for Senator George C. Brownell, Clackamas county; I. A. Macrum, Washington county; J. T. Bridges, Douglas county; and F. W. Chances, Josephine county.

The appointment of delegates was fixed on the basis established for the republican state convention. Before the close of the meeting, which was very harmonious, J. T. Bridges moved that the delegates be authorized to select a committee from Douglas county. No action was taken, but the fact that Mr. Bridges is a federal office-holder and the administration has been taken upon the delegates meddles with politics, is significant. No action was taken upon the resolution.

DISGRACEFUL SCENE IN THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—In the Senate this afternoon at 2:45 p. m., a fight occurred between Senators McMillan and Tillman, both of South Carolina. McMillan arose and said that Tillman's statement regarding him was a "wild and deliberate and malicious lie." A violent encounter ensued. Both men clenched and struck frantically at each other, when Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms sprang between them and several Senators rushed to the aid and parted them. It was with great difficulty that the men were parted.

PRINCE HENRY ARRIVES.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—The Kronshtadt, with Prince Henry on board, arrived at 1 o'clock this morning, off Nantuxet lighthouse. She will arrive at Sandy Hook at 10 o'clock this morning.

The mayor of New York yesterday received the following telegram from the Mayor of Berlin, Germany:

"On this day, when New York greets the brother of the Kaiser as its guest, we cordially express our joy over the close friendship of American and German and our hopes of its continuance and strengthening."

A TERRIBLE FIRE.

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—Five early this morning, in the Park Avenue Hotel and the Second Regiment Armory, this city, resulted in the loss of 15 lives and the destruction of property valued at \$100,000. The dead persons were all guests at the hotel. The flames first started in the Armory, and 45 minutes later the hotel was in flames.
