HARRY ANDREWS MEETS DEATH.
Body Cut into Fifty Pieces by the Car Wheels—Head Completely Severed.

Ashland Town Talk gives the following particulars regarding the horrible death of the young man mentioned in our last issue:

A horrible accident happened just this side of Talent, opposite the gate in the fence which surrounds Engineer D. McCarty's orchard, early Thursday morning. It was 6 o'clock a. m. on that day when Dan Hausman discovered the remains of a man scattered along the railroad track.

The body of the unfortunate man was cut into not more than fifty pieces, and these were strewn along for a distance of 50 yards. The head was entirely severed from the body and layed at the side of the track in the ditch. The skull was broken and the right eye entirely removed from its socket. The limbs of the man were cut off close to the trunk and were not mutilated in any way. After the train reached Roseburg the man's head was picked up from the sand d. board. The trucks under the car were covered with blood.

From two boxes who were in Ashland Thursday and who passed as a witness to the coroner's inquest, which was held in Talent Thursday afternoon, we learn that the name of the young man was Harry Andrews, he was 22 years, a cook by occupation, and that his home was in Riverside, Cal. He was beating the way northward on an extra freight train in charge of Conductor V. Snyder. These two men were with the unfortunate coming over the Siskiyous, they stopping in Ashland while he took an early morning freight out of this place. They did not know his name.

He had black hair and brown eyes, smooth face and weighed about 140 pounds. Height 5 feet 6 inches.

In the pockets of Andrews were found three silk handkerchiefs and \$2.22 in money. He wore a pair of shoes which were in good condition and probably cost \$2.50, a light brown derby hat and a good suit of clothes. The socks worn were black, as was his shirt, and the cuffs of the shirt were a pair of gold link cuff buttons, set with small pearls. A package of "English Curve" tobacco was also found upon the remains.

The unfortunate was probably riding the rode and in some way caught his feet, when he was thrown head first to the track, this conclusion being arrived at from the fact that the legs were not mutilated, while no other part of the body was spared.

DEATH OF PAUL KLINGELE.
A Prominent Merchant of Glendale Succumbs to a Brief Illness.

It is with profound sorrow that we chronicle the sudden death of Paul Klingele, of the firm of Sonnenschein & Klingele, of Glendale, which occurred at the family residence at 9 o'clock the 21 inst. He was 42 years, 5 mo. and 24 days.

Mr. Klingele died from strangulation of the bowels after about 12 hours illness. He went on horseback to his wood-camp on Totter creek and spent the day looking after the business of the firm. Starting home at 4:30 p. m. he was taken with cramps about 20 minutes after leaving the wood-camp and grew worse so fast that it was with difficulty that he reached home. Thinking it only a trilling illness, he applied the usual home remedies but to no avail. At 1 o'clock a. m. Dr. Bowersox was called and later Dr. Bowersox called Dr. DeVore of Canyonville. All that medical skill could do, was done, and at 9 a. m. Mr. Klingele was told that he had only a few hours to live. He died at once for Rev. Blair, and in his own beloved language listened to the words of consolation from the Sacred Book. With prayer made at his request he humbly acknowledged the wisdom of God and expressed his faith in a risen Redeemer. He was fully conscious until the end, and his last utterance in the agony of death was "pray" and with loving words to his idolized wife and baby boy, his spirit took its flight to the God he had served for so many years.

Mr. Klingele and family had resided at Glendale for two years and had the confidence and esteem of every man, woman and child in this city. He was a man of excellent business qualifications. The city of Glendale has lost one of her best citizens. A devoted wife and loving little son have lost all that made their lives worth living, and to them, in this dark hour of grief, the hearts of the people go out with loving sympathy.

Most impressive services were conducted at Olivant Presbyterian church at 6 p. m. by Rev. Blair. After the services the body was borne to the depot by members of Glendale Lodge No. W. of A. of which Mr. Klingele was an honored member and later was taken to Salem where the funeral occurred at 2 p. m. Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Sonnenschein and daughters accompanied the widowed wife and son with the remains to Salem.

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." They rest from their labors and their works do follow them. MOLLIE.

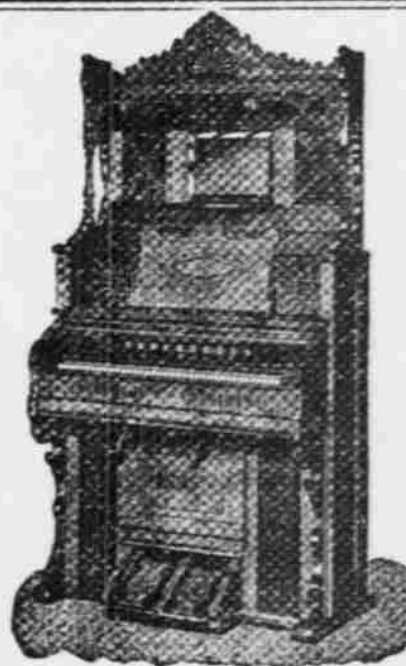
