

That a large number of the veterans are married and will leave widows who will draw pensions will not alter the general result, as most of the wives of the veterans are pioneers, and their average is nearly as great as the veterans. The Senate bill provides for a pension of \$8 per month for the veterans and the widows of veterans. Over 7000 men served in the nine years of Indian warfare in Oregon and Washington. Of this number 1800 were killed on the field of battle.

A MOST SEVERE STORM.

San Francisco Swept by a Big Gale Tuesday.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 25.—The heaviest in years swept over San Francisco today, cutting off communication by wire and doing considerable damage at the Ferry Building and in the Mission residence district, where three buildings were torn down. The barometer was broken one inch higher than at the time of the Galveston storm, which was the greatest ever recorded in this country, after it dragged anchor, and the transport Solace careened about the bay as a drunken sailor. All the steamers in the harbor are broken, railroad tracks have been washed away in places, and telephone lines prostrated, and small buildings blown down.

Resolution of Confidence.

If the bill providing a pension for the veterans in the Indian War from 1847 to 1855, which was passed by the Senate last week, through the efforts of Senator John H. Mitchell, should be adopted by the lower house and become a law, it will benefit only about 10,000 people in Oregon and Washington. The surviving veterans and widows of veterans are supposed to be about that number. Their average is 73 years. This estimate also includes the widows.
