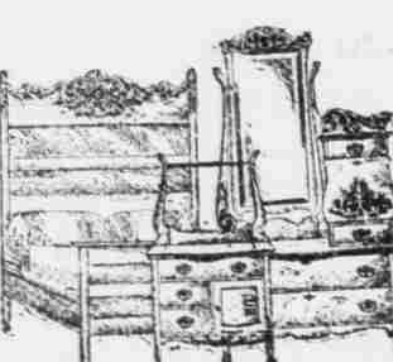

PLAINDEALER'S BILL.

Publishing Co., Dr. To publishing
delinquent tax list 783 lines, 9 times,
at 25 cents per line, \$195.75.

The Review suggests that the
above matter be submitted to a com-
mittee to investigate. We have
urged all the while that any one in-
terested, take the pains to call at the
county clerk's office and investigate
for themselves, and we hereby chal-
lenge the Review editor or any one
else to show wherein the first two
bills above are not copied word for
word from the Review editor's own
hand writing on those documents on
file in the clerk's office. What that
professional grafter was allowed by
the county court on these bills we
know not, neither do we care, but
the fact that he made the above
charges is irrefutable and we again
challenge him to prove through a
committee or otherwise that he did
not make the above charges to the
county for the publication of the tax
list. And, as we have said be-
fore, whether the county court dis-
counted his bills or not, does not ren-
der his disposition to overcharge the
county for this advertising the less
odious in the eyes of the tax payers.
Our charge of 25 cents per line for
this advertising is very reasonable
and as cheap as the advertising is
being done in any county in the
state, and is just "one-half" the price
originally received in this county.

Call for Republican Primaries and
County Convention.

Notice is hereby given that at a meet-
ing of the Republican County Central
Committee of Douglas County, Oregon,
held at Roseburg, Oregon, on the 15th
of the month of March, 1902, it was
ordered that the primaries for the respec-
tive precincts be held on March 22nd, 1902,
commencing at 10 o'clock p. m. and closing
at 5 o'clock p. m. of said day and that the
County Convention be held at Roseburg,
Oregon, on Saturday the 29th day of
March, 1902, commencing at 10 o'clock a.
m.

A CASE OF BLISSFUL IGNORANCE.

"The city council last week submitted
bills for the publication of the tax list
to the Plaindealer and Review. The con-
tract was awarded to the Plaindealer
for \$12, the Review's bid being \$12.50
as much, or \$24. Which paper mani-
fests the greater 'graft' propensities?"

Under this offer for competitive bids,
Conner at once saw there was no oppor-
tunity for a graft and therefore asked
what he thinks his space is really worth.
The Review estimates that the list would
occupy 200 lines (it actually requires 209)
and this at 12 cents per line would be
worth \$24, yet Conner, according to his
statement above quoted, offers to do
the work for less than six cents per line,
or less than one fourth what he proposes
to charge the county. The county board
should have been as wise as the city
fathers and secured his bid in advance,
but now their only alternative is to allow
him but the amount of his bid published
offer, 12 cents per line, which figure
be since advice is more than twice what
his space is worth. In doing this the
county board will be subverting their
interests, as well as those of the taxpay-
ers, and they will be expected to do so.

In the above we have another fit-
ting illustration of the pitiable igno-
rance of the imbecile editor of the Re-
view. The publication of the delin-
quent tax list and the publication of
the street improvement assessment
comes no nearer under one and the
same head than does our local dis-
play ads and our timberland notices.
For instance, the sheriff's delinquent
tax list was required to appear twice
a week in the Plaindealer for thirty
days or 9 times, while the city street
improvement assessment role re-
quires but one insertion a week for
twenty days which is just one-
third the number of insertions requir-
ed for the county printing. The
street improvement assessment being
a matter in which all our citizens are
deeply interested we had promised to
give the list one publication in our
paper free of charge as a matter of
news, leaving practically but 2 issues
for which any compensation is re-
quired. The fact that the Plaindealer
by its reasonable charges and fair-
treatment is securing more than its
full share of local and county patron-
age keeps our envoy neighbor, the
Review, in a ver bad humor, and in-
flames its dyspeptic, imbecile editor,
which accounts for the ignominious
fight he is waging against the Plain-
dealer. The fellow would make an
excellent figure on a platform before
a picture on a postcard as a label or
testimonial.
