VENISON CASE DISMISSED—In the case of the State of Oregon vs. Henry Boren and Al Crouch, of Canas Valley, who were arrested and held in Justice Robinson's court for the unlawful possession of venison, was dismissed on motion of the District Attorney Geo. M. Brown for the reason that the complaint did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action, under the evidence, and the court very promptly allowed the motion, stating that as the court understood the law, one must have the possession of venison for the purpose of sale, barter or exchange, where a defendant is simply charged with having venison in possession.

An Expensive Case.

The case of Geo. H. Stevenson vs. Oley Boone, to replevin a colt was heard in Justice Robinson's court Wednesday before the following jury: J. C. Aiken, J. B. Byers, Wm. Hodson, L. Schmeisser, E. C. Gaddis and L. D. Carle. The animal in controversy is a "pinto" pony purchased by Mr. Boone of Mrs. Emma Harvey, and the plaintiff alleges that the colt really belonged to him. Fifteen or more witnesses were called for both the plaintiff and defendant and the case was hotly contested, the cost of the proceedings exceeding many times the value of the property in controversy.

JURY'S VERDICT. Wednesday evening at about 9 o'clock the jury returned the following verdict: "We, the jury, unpurloined to try the above entitled action in said district court and state find for the plaintiff; that he is the owner of and entitled to the immediate possession of that certain white and black spotted colt, described in the complaint; that if possession thereof cannot be had that plaintiff have its value which we find to be \$200.

L. D. CARLE, Foreman. No special damages were allowed for the detention of the colt by defendant.

The Douglas County Prohibition Convention was held at the courthouse Wednesday, March 19, 1902. W. A. Wood was elected chairman and W. E. Good, secretary of the convention. The following ticket was placed in the field: Representatives Wm. Edmondson, Gardner, and Ira Wimberly, Drain; county judge, E. M. Marsters, Roseburg; county commissioner, Noah Coranitt, Riddle; clerk, E. W. Bryant, Roseburg; sheriff, L. A. Walker, Roseburg; assessor, Mark Munson, Roseburg; treasurer, B. F. Scott, Riddle.

The juryman were: W. L. Watkins, Harvey Jones, Jas. Hildebrand, T. B. Cannon, A. O. Rose and Geo. Perry. After hearing the testimony and arguments the jury returned a verdict of guilty and the recorder fixed the penalty at \$18 and costs. It is said the case will be appealed to the circuit court.
