Board of Trade Meeting.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the board of trade was held in the city hall Tuesday evening.

In the absence of President F. W. Woolley to his old home in Minnesota, Vice President Louis Barzee presided at this meeting. The meeting was fairly well attended and much good work is being accomplished.

A communication was read from a New York gentleman representing a large number of very desirable home-seekers who desire information regarding Roseburg and Douglas county, where they contemplate casting their lot, having grown weary of the long, extremely cold winters and sultry summers of the north Atlantic States. The board will supply the gentleman with the information desired. A similar letter was also read from a Manitoba, Canada, home-seeker.

The committee on advertising reported that the Douglas county pamphlet would not be ready for distribution by the first of next week, the work now being in the hands of the printers. The committee also reported that an ad had been placed in several Eastern and Middle Western newspapers of prominence setting forth the advantages and opportunities open to home-seekers and investors in Douglas county, referring to the board of trade for information and particulars regarding this county and its resources.

The presiding officer, Louis Barzee set forth the fact that Douglas county's remaining public domain, yet affords many tracts suitable for homes, providing they are taken by an energetic, wide awake class of people with enough capital to aid in developing this government land. Senator Masters, Hon. B. S. K. Buick, Attorney C. S. Jackson, D. P. Fisher, and H. M. Martin also spoke on this question bringing out the fact also that while nearly all the valuable, first-class timber tracts have already been taken, much desirable second and third class timber lands yet remains to be located by mill and lumbermen in this county. Much of this land was also shown to be very valuable for stock range.

A special meeting will be held next Tuesday evening for the purpose of receiving and making arrangements for the distribution of the Douglas county pamphlets, providing they are printed by that time.

The Burlington officials have started a campaign against intoxicants with a view to reducing their use by the employees of every department not only on duty, but also while off duty. Therefore the stringent rules against the use of liquor while on duty have only been enforced against those who had anything to do with the operation of trains. Hereafter the rule will be enforced against the employees of all departments, including even the tracks, bridge and building departments.

Members of these departments upon receiving their new books of rules were surprised to read the rule: "The use of intoxicants by employees while on duty is prohibited. Their habitual use or the frequenting of places where they are sold is sufficient cause for dismissal."

Thomas Sawyer, one of the oldest engineers in the employ of the Southern Pacific Company and the discoverer of the air compressing plan which bears his name, died at his home in Sacramento, Sunday, the 19th inst. It was Sawyer who discovered that when a locomotive was running free with the throttle closed the cylinders could be turned into air compressors by throwing the throttle lever into the lock position. Engineers had known this fact for some time, but Sawyer was the first to put it in use. He ran a pipe from the steam chest to the air reservoir with a globe valve in the end. By this device when a train is approaching a station the engineer throws over his reverse lever, opens the valve in the end and the resulting air pressure is added to that supplied by the regular air pump. The device is in use by the railroad all over the country and especially on mountain lines where Sawyer was running when he made his discovery.
