LATE NEWS SUMMARY

Important Events of the Past Few Days.

STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.

Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.

Two thousand Canadians are being enlisted for the British army in South Africa.

Ex-President Paul Kruger of the Transvaal is very ill with influenza. His recovery is doubtful.

The Senate has agreed to vote on the Chinese exclusion bill before adjournment on Wednesday next.

The files of the Baker-Democratic covering a period of 31 years, were burned in the recent fire in the Democrat office.

Miss Alice Roosevelt arrived here at the White House last Thursday from her trip to Cuba. Miss Roosevelt expressed herself as having enjoyed the trip greatly.

The state ticket of the Prohibitionist Party, headed by the Rev. A. J. Hunsaker of Yamhill County for Governor, has been placed on file in the office of the Secretary of State.

John A. Jeffrey of Salem, was nominated for the joint senator of Linn and Marion counties by acclamation at a meeting of the delegates representing those counties in the Democratic state convention.

Governor Over declares that he is not a candidate for Senator, and further, that he intends to retire entirely from politics, for the very good reason that it "doesn't pay," in any sense, at least for an honest man.

Engene F. Ware, of Kansas, has been elected by the President as Commissioner of Fisheries. Mr. Ware is from Topeka, Kan., and is a member of the law firm of Giesler, Ward & Giesler.

While it is impossible to keep accurate account of the settlers coming into Oregon, it is estimated by railway officials that no less than 7000 people have located in this state since the inauguration of the low-rate colonist excursion about a month ago.

Geo. B. Corvay, private secretary to President Roosevelt and former Private Secretary to both President McKinley and President Cleveland, is now prominently mentioned as the possible head of the new governmental department of the Department of Commerce.

Three thousand Chinese troops and a number of Krupp guns have been dispatched to Southern Mongolia, where the people are in revolt against the Chinese government. Several villages have been strongly fortified and their inhabitants are determined to fight. They say they are assured of the assistance of 20,000 disaffected persons.

P. G. Morris, defuncting treasurer of Linn county, was released from the penitentiary Friday, having served about half his sentence of four years. Governor Over commuted the sentence on the condition that Morris' friends should reimburse the bondsmen, which they did. The ex-treasurer was more ruined against than ruining as the money went to numerous friends in accommodation loans. Morris himself used it wrothfully.

The truck crusher, with a capacity of 18 tons per hour, and the four road graders which were recently purchased by the county have been received and were yesterday inspected by County Judge Scott. The residents of the vicinity of Gervais, who have raised \$600 to expend on the bettering of the roads of that section of the county, will be given the first chance to benefit by the new appliances as an incentive to other sections to wake up on this important matter, says a Salem dispatch.

Mary E. Beck has brought suit in the Multnomah county state circuit court against W. H. Beck for divorce, alleging that she was often compelled to wear her husband's clothes because he would not provide others for her. They were married in Lane county in 1878, and have six children. The youngest, aged 2 years is with the mother, the other five are with the father in Smithfield, Lane county. She charges her husband of falsly accusing her, and says he did not provide for her the necessities of life.

Mrs. S. P. Busby, wife of the assistant cashier of the American National bank of Everett, Wash., killed her husband and four-year-old son last Thursday and then turned the revolver and sent a bullet crashing through her brain. The terrible tragedy was committed in the presence of Mr. Busby's mother and the servant girl, an 18 month old babe being spared also. The only cause ascribed for the deed is a violent attack of insanity, the woman having been ill for some time.

OREGON'S NEXT GOVERNOR.

Foreign Will Work for the Election of Entire Ticket.

The DALLAS, April 10.—W. J. Furnish, candidate for Governor, stopped off in this city yesterday to attend the funeral of the late Robert Nays, while enroute to Portland.

Speaking of political subjects he said: "I am going to Portland, La. to help arrange for the coming campaign. I expect to take the stump in my own behalf, also for the benefit of the quills tied up against me at the state convention. I regard Gov. E. Chamberlain as the strongest man in the opposition, and I do not consider the slightest doubt, unless I follow the regular Republican majority for this office to be beaten down one jot. The Republican party will be contented as soon as an old friend for every one of the State and Congressional candidates when the day of the election comes, notwithstanding the claim and the split and dissension by the opposition. The harder they work against me, the more assistantly I will work for myself. I am going to be Oregon's next Governor."

BIQ ANIMAL CIRCUS.

Coming to Roseburg Thursday April 24.

Notwithstanding the fact that the circus will appear in Roseburg Thursday April 24 under their large water-proof tent which will be located on Pine Street. Two performances will be given daily at 2 and 8 p. m. Norris and Row's shows are more than twice the size of last season, and many new features have been added. Among these features are the trained lions which perform on a boy's back while riding at full speed around a ring, which is a new act, never before seen in this country. Fargo, Duke and Hers, the dwarf elephants, have been taught several new acts which are wonderful, and the staccato seals are appearing in new and novel feats of skill. Two Siberian camels and two trained elk, with their numerous tricks, are performers of high class merit. These combined with the animals that have been with the shows in past years make more than an interesting entertainment. A funny dog show and a large lipposome track, upon which all kinds of races and Olympic games are run, and sometimes take place, also new special features. The animal department has been improved and elaborated upon. A grand free street carnival and children's fairland parade will be given at 11 o'clock on the morning of the exhibition at which time the entire company of over 300 animals will be seen.

Detroit Murderer Confesses.

DETROIT, April 11.—Professor Joseph M. Miller, at 12 o'clock, confessed to committing the murder of Carrie M. Jennett. After being in the sweatbox one hour and 20 minutes, Miller broke down and confessed to the crime. Assistant Prosecutor Merriam and three officers were present.

Miller said that he had illicit relations with the girl, and was responsible for her condition. He stated he offered to send Miss Jennett to a hospital, but she refused to go, insisting that he leave his family and go to some other city with her. This he would not do. Wednesday night, when he started from home for the lodge meeting he had an engagement with the girl, and intended to kill her. He took the hatchet that was found in his kitchen with him. He secured this on Seventh street on his way to the meeting. When he left the lodge-room he secured the hatchet again and proceeded to the corner of Fourteenth and Warren avenues, where he met Miss Jennett. They walked over to their tenth street and out to where the killing was done.

Miller says that they sat down on the sidewalk and talked for a while, the girl urging him to abandon his family and leave the city with her. He then whipped out the hatchet and struck her on the head. When asked why he mutilated her so, Miller said he had no recollection of anything after the first blow until he found himself wiping the blood off his hatchet on the grass in the vacant lot.

Onion Industry at Eagle Point.

Onion raising as a profitable branch of agriculture is assuming extensive proportions in the vicinity of Eagle Point. The success of last year has acted as an incentive to the planting of an increased acreage for the coming season and there will be about 30 acres devoted to the raising of the excellent vegetable. That this amount of land will produce an enormous yield under ordinary conditions is proved by experience of past years. From one and three-fifths acres one man raised 90,000 pounds of onions. Another cleared \$400 from considerable less than an acre of ground. At a low estimate the grower receives one cent a pound, and where nearly thirty tons is produced from one acre, it requires but slight mental effort to see that there is money in onions.

Visits Charleston Exhibit and Says He is Coming West.

ASHLAND MOUNT MYRTLE CREEK.

R. M. Foster, superintendent of the Southern Oregon Oil Co., and Fred Marsh, head driller at the Ashland well, left for Myrtle Creek last evening, where they have closed a contract with the Empire Valley Oil Co. to do some drilling pending the resumption of operations here. They will introduce larger and heavier tools at Myrtle Creek's well and will push operations as fast as practicable. At present the big drill there is 25 feet in hole and the well is reaching a depth of 100 feet. The new contract provides for bringing the well to a depth of 1500 feet unless oil is found beforehand. However, the officers of the company do not think that a depth of 1500 feet need be attained before the oil is discovered.—Times.
