Democratic Platform Plank Shattered

Not a title has been registered under the Torrens land law, passed by the last legislature, and probably never will be. The people don't want it on the books.—Evening Democrat. The people do want the Torrens land law, a few abstract companies to the contrary notwithstanding. During the session of 1889 the paid lobby of the abstract companies which was maintained at Salem during the session, managed to defeat the measure after a prolonged struggle. Last session the same lobby was maintained, and abstractors from all parts of the state were brought to Salem to persuade members to vote against the Torrens bill, but owing to the diligent efforts of its author, Senator Percy R. Kelley, of this county, and to the intense attack on the corrupt lobbyists, the measure became a law. The lobby was sustained at Salem by a cash assessment upon nearly every abstract company in the state. The Torrens land law is a just and meritorious measure in the interest of the people. The only argument used against it is that it will do away with abstractors, abstract companies and lawyers examining fees. People who have had occasion to deal with abstract companies know what they are at the mercy of these monopolies. The farmers of Linn county demanded the passage of the Torrens law and they were seconded by the farmers throughout the state. The howl set up by the Democratic convention is presumably dictated by local parties who are interested in extorting high prices from people transferring land and city property. The people want the Torrens land law.—Albany Herald.

RUSSIAN MINISTER ASSASSINATED.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 15.—The Minister of the Interior, M. Sipagine, was shot and fatally wounded at 1 o'clock this morning in the lobby of the Ministerial offices, by a man who held a pistol close to the Minister's person. The wounded man died at 2 p.m.

Dole is Sustained.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The following official statement was made at the White House today:

The President, after most careful investigation and hearing as many men as possible, and hearing from others, has come to the conclusion that Governor Dole's course has been such as to warrant his continuance as Governor of Hawaii, and entitles him to the respect and hearty support of the administration.

The Governor was a caller at the White House today, and said he would go to Boston for a short visit, and in about two weeks would sail for Honolulu.

McLaurin Out of Contempt.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Today for the first time the personal encounter between the South Carolina senators, Tillman and McLaurin, when they were declared in contempt, Senator McLaurin addressed the Senate.

The Senator spoke briefly on the Mitchell Chinese exclusion bill, opposing the passage of the same. He claimed that Chinese cheap labor was necessary for Southern industry, and that their exclusion would be disastrous.

Will Pay Higher Wages.

CHICAGO, April 14.—Railroads of Chicago have voluntarily increased the wages of freight handlers. The advance varies in the different departments, but the total increase is \$25,000 per month, and affects 800 men employed in freight depots of Chicago.

A Wife's Revenge.

GRANT COUNTY, O. T., April 14.—A shocking murder has been committed here. Farmer Peoples went home drunk, beat his wife and after ordering her to sleep, went to sleep with his head leaning against a pine partition. When supper was ready, the woman tried to awaken him, but failed. Fearing that he would beat her again, Mrs. Peoples drove a nail through from the other side of the partition into the man's head, killing him. She was arrested.
