MITCHELL'S BILL DEFEATED.

Chinese Troops Slaughtered. The Belgium Crisis.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Senate. The first vote was on Lodge's amendment to strike out the clause of the committee bill prohibiting Chinese sailors on ships carrying the American flag. The Lodge amendment was carried, 41 to 29.

The billingham amendment allowing five representatives of Chinese, mercantile houses to come to the United States was defeated 31 to 57.

An amendment to the Platt substitute offered by Mitchell to compel registration of Chinese in the Philippines within eight months after the passage of the act, was adopted, 41 to 40.

The Platt substitute was adopted, 48 to 33.

CHINESE TROOPS SLAUGHTERED.

HONG KONG, April 16.—Over 2000 Imperial soldiers, sent by Marshal Su against the rebels, were ambushed in a narrow defile and all were killed or captured. The situation in the rebellious districts of Southern China is increasingly alarming.

The Russians surrounded 800 Chinese at Kiang Tung Tai, and only 30 of them escaped. The Russian losses are very small.

THE BELGIAN REVOLTS.

BRUSSELS, April 16.—The number of strikers in the chief industrial centers are estimated 150,000.

Fire and dynamite are the weapons of Anarchy used by Belgian workers. The great glass works at Courcelles were burned last night and bombs were exploded in various parts of the kingdom. About 150,000 Socialist strikers are now in the struggle.

Death of Ashford Clayton.

Ashford Clayton, an Oregon pioneer of 1852, died at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland on Monday evening, April 14, 1902, aged 77 years. Thence, he had been operated upon Monday morning for a severe bladder ailment, but with the advanced stage of the disease, treatment was unavailing. The body was brought here Wednesday morning and taken to his home in Coles Valley for interment, which took place at 11 o'clock a. m. today.

Mr. Clayton was an Oregon pioneer of 1852, and settled upon his homestead claim in Coles Valley in 1853, where he has resided continuously ever since. He was born in Ohio, May 19, 1825. His wife died a few years since, but six daughters and two sons survive. They are: Mrs. W. H. B. Clayton, of Orange, Calif.; Mrs. Dr. L. A. Kent of Portland; Mrs. Jessie Clark, of Corvallis; Mrs. Lora McLean and Mrs. Clara St. Clair, of Washington; Mrs. Mary Fabrique, of Lewiston, Idaho; Albert S. and Grant Clayton, of this county.

Letter From Gardiner.

GARDINER, Oregon, April 14, 1902. EDITOR PLAIN DEALER.—I saw by the last issue of the Nonpareil that Mr. Kelly has put an extra feather in his own bonnet.

Will you kindly give me space to answer several questions and assertions that he makes?

Mr. Kelly asks the question, "If Mr. Rogers, as admitted by the doctor, did not receive the Gardiner vote, then how did he assert for himself, or the rise of Roseburg, due to take upon itself to declare that he was the Simon pure representative of the Republican party in the northern part of Douglas county?"

Does Mr. Kelly intend this as one of a set of hypothetical questions? But hypothetical or otherwise I will answer them so far as I can.

I did not say that Mr. Rogers did not receive the Gardiner vote for it is well known that Mr. Gray was withdrawn in favor of Mr. Rogers. If Mr. Rogers said or authorized the statement that he was for Simon it will be news for the Republicans here and they will expect Mr. Kelly to prove his assertion or acknowledge that he has been expending his energy upon a strawman of his own manufacture.

Mr. Kelly says again, "It is a pretty poor representative of the party, because, that in such a wide extent of territory he makes such a poor showing as three votes, and worse still, doctor, when you write such an execrable poor letter in his defense."

Mr. Rogers received the full support of his home delegation from Lake. He received two of the six from Gardiner for first choice and all of the Gardiner votes on second choice rather than let the honor go from this section.

I admit that my letter, as a defense of Mr. Rogers is an overboard, poor one and the sensible reason for this is that I do not seek to defend Mr. Rogers in any part of my article as that gentleman is quite competent to handle his own case.

Now, Mr. Kelly, I have no time for newspaper controversy, however much I might enjoy it for such a fight would afford me the keenest delight as you come of a stock that strikes from the shoulder. Of all the newspaper men in Douglas county you would be pre-eminently my choice as an opponent. Some people might characterize this choice as you did my letter—an execrable poor one—but my twenty years acquaintance with you justifies the assertion and it really would give me great satisfaction to say with Scott—

"But fear not, doubt not, which thou wilt."

We try this quarrel hot to hit."
