**Important Events of the Past Few Days.**

**STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.**

**Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.**

The Chicago World's Fair Company still has \$400,000 profits to give stockholders.

The year-old daughter of W. Tillman of The Dalles fell backwards into a tub of boiling water. She died from her injuries.

Three Japs were arrested at Meacham and brought to Pendleton on the charge of killing songbirds in violation of the law the other day.

The total number of prisoners in the Oregon penitentiary at Salem is 318 as against 384 confined in the penitentiary of the State of Washington.

The graduating class of the Oregon Agricultural College will consist of 24 this year. They will not appear in cap and gown, it having been otherwise decided.

The census returns relating to manufactures in the United States shows the number of wage-earners in 1900 as 82,371,000, which is an increase of 25 per cent over the number employed in 1880.

The Chinese section going on the Southern Pacific at Corvallis has been replaced by a force of white laborers. The company made the change in response to a petition signed by the business men of the town.

How are our manufacturers treating the world? The Boston Transcript says that even when it comes to the copying of an English King, an American manufacturer is supplying London with thousands of "official" counterfeit buttons.

The lumber shipments from Oregon in 1901 amounted to about 24,000 carloads. Present indications show that this year's shipments will exceed those of last year by more than 50 per cent. It would seem that the future possibilities in this direction are illimitable.

Uncle Sam continues to get John Bull's money. According to recent English statistics \$30,000,000 represents the largest sum of money exported from the United States to Great Britain since 1895. In addition to this \$40,000,000 worth of mules have gone to South Africa.

The papers here had a good deal to say about Prof. Loeb, of New York City, who is trying to produce life chemically. He thinks he is pretty close to the solution. But ten to one he is not. **LATEST NEWS.**

**Teddy Will Visit the West. Another Russian Assassination. Lives Saved By a Baby.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 18.—It is given out upon the authority of a United States Senator who is particularly friendly to President Roosevelt, that the President will make a tour of the South and West not later than next year, possibly sooner.

The tour will include a visit to the principal Southern cities, thence to California, Oregon and Washington and back through the Northern States. Roosevelt is not familiar with California and Oregon to the extent that he would like, though he knows Colorado, Arizona, Wyoming and other Western States.

It is surmised that his trip will have much political significance, as there is no doubt as to his candidacy for a second term.

VIENNA, April 18.—M Skippop a high Russian official was assassinated while traveling on a train in Austrian territory today. The assassin made no attempt to escape and was arrested. He claims to be a college student.

**THE BABY SAVED THEM**

NEW YORK, April 19.—According to a statement by Miss Stone, the released missionary, she owes much, if not her life itself, to the baby—Mrs. Tsilka's baby. After its arrival the mother and Miss Stone, she relates, were treated with far greater consideration; threats that they would soon be killed unless the ransom arrived ceased, and they were better cared for.

**NOT IN SYMPATHY WITH THEIR PLATFORM.**

The democratic state platform is the latest joke of the season. "Buncombe" expresses one-half of it, and indecision and "fraid-to-touch it" the other half. The platform committee had a hot fight that lasted from early morning until 8 o'clock at night over the Philippine plank and ended by inserting a kind of half-hearted "scuttle" plank. There was a strong minority in the convention that desired to openly declare for the retention of the Islands and succeeded in getting the committee to first draft such a plank, and this plank would have been adopted had it not been for the idea that it was necessary to anti-whatever the republicans were doing. This is one case where a political party drafted a platform that they are not in sympathy with, simply to the contrary. It will cost them many votes throughout the state.—Criterion.

**CHINESE IN BAD ODOR AT SKAGWAY.**

SEATTLE, April 18.—The steamer Dolphin arrived this morning from Skagway with \$50,000 in gold. It reports an anti-Chinese mass meeting being held in Skagway, and says that the indications are that the Chinese will be ejected from that city. If this be done, it is not likely that they will be permitted to settle down at any other point in Alaska.

**BELGIAN STRIKE CONTINUES.**

BRUSSELS, April 18.—At a meeting of the representatives of the striking workmen in council it was voted to continue the strike to the bitter end. The strike has extended to the printers who hold employment in the capital and other large cities.

**A DEFECTIVE ANTI-TRUST LAW.**

ST. LOUIS, April 18.—The supreme court of Missouri has just handed down a decision in which it is held that the anti-trust law enacted by the recent legislature is unconstitutional.

**PEACE THREE DAYS OFF.**

LONDON, April 18.—The consideration of all peace proposals have been postponed three days in order to allow the Transvaal and Orange Free State representatives an opportunity to adjust differences.

**REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGN.**

**State Central Committee Will Start The Ball Rolling May 1.**

**TICKET UNIVERSALLY ENDORSED.**

**Mr. W. J. Farnish Will Visit Every County In the State.**

W. F. Matthews, chairman of the Republican State Central Committee of Oregon has appointed H. C. Smith secretary of the committee. Mr. Smith, who is considered as probably one of the best detail men in the party in the state, well informed and competent to do the very best service, will enter upon his duties today. Commemorative headquarters for the committee have been established in the Benson building, corner Fifth and Morrison streets, Portland, comprising five rooms.

Plans are being worked out preparatory to making a perfect organization in every precinct in the state. This is an immense task for the managers of the party, but they are good generals in command and the work is progressing rapidly. Before the campaign begins to earnest the Republican party will have the finest organization it has ever had in Oregon, and the work is being attended to systematically.

Particular attention is being given to being out the Republican vote. The committee is determined to make a showing, which will stand as an example to be followed in the future. Every possible means will be used to arouse interests in the approaching election in the Republican ranks, and the voters will be registered thoroughly, and ones registered they will be induced to vote the full party strength in June.

Until the 1st of April the committee will continue its preparations. Beginning with May 1, the campaign on the Republican side will commence in earnest and for the following month every nook and corner of the state will be aroused.

There are already a number of volunteers ready to take the stump and go through the state. Every orator in the party is anxious, apparently, to devote several weeks on the stump. No spell-binder, however, will be started out before May. The notice are now being dispersed and the available speakers being carefully selected.

From all parts of the state comes to the state committee encouraging reports as to the popularity of the Republican ticket and endorsement of the ruling platform adopted by the recent state convention of the party.

The Salem Republican Club will tender W. J. Farnish, nominee for Governor, an exception this week. It is proposed to have the attendance of all the Republican candidates for state offices as well as the event will practically be the opening of the Marion county campaign.

Hon. William J. Farnish, the Republican nominee for Governor, will make a vigorous campaign of the state and will visit every county. He will make at least one and possibly two visits to Douglas and the Southern Oregon counties.

**NATIONAL GOOD ROAD MOVEMENT**

Senator Hanna and Hon. Ginger Hermann Champion the Good Cause.

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va., April 14.—The speech of Senator Mark Hanna, at Albion, was the feature of this closing day of the Jefferson Memorial Good Roads Convention. The speech was not a long one, consisting scarcely five minutes of the convention's time, but when it was concluded so much of Virginia as was represented in the audience of something more than a thousand people, had surrendered enthusiastically to Hanna, and Hanna in return had bowed graciously to an adoption as one of the Old Dominion's favorite sons.

**MR. HERMANN'S ADDRESS.**

The address of Commissioner Hermann, who presided Senator Hanna, was one of the ablest delivered before the convention, and showed evidences of careful preparation. Mr. Hermann proceeded without attempt at oratory, but the subject matter of his address easily held the close attention of his hearers. He told of the important part good roads play in the development of the resources of a nation and showed how the most prosperous States of the Union have been those that paid early attention to their public highways.

Mr. Hermann strongly advocated governmental assistance in the construction of highways, and pointed as an early precedent the building of the great national turnpikes, which he declared was one of the brightest jewels in Thomas Jefferson's crown of fame. "For years," he said, "the government has expended its generous attention to the improvement of the waterways of the country in order that facilities for cheap transportation may be increased and improved, and it is claimed that Congress, not justly discriminates in failing to provide for the landways of the country. This is the reasoning which, later on, may have consideration in the National Legislature." Mr. Hermann showed also that the government has been liberal in its aid to railroads, and that while some assistance has been given to wagon roads the subject has not received the attention at the hands of Congress that it deserves.

In closing, Mr. Hermann paid tribute to the illustrious sons of Virginia, and his eloquence in recounting their heroic deeds and splendid services won him enthusiastic applause from his sympathetic audience.
