The election of Gov. E. Chamberlain for governor is conceded by many republicans, says a Democratic exchange. The Republicans do not concede anything of the kind, because they too well know, say the Democrats themselves that Chamberlain will fall short 8,000 or 10,000 votes of being elected. Of course the Democratic press must try to inspire courage among the faltering Democratic hosts and it seeks to do this by making unreasonable assertions and predictions. There is only two charges the Democrats can present against Mr. Furnish, one being that he manifested the good sense to quit the old party of "adversity" and "do-nothing" and join a real loyal and progressive American party. The other is that he is a practical and successful business man, who by his thrift, energy, integrity and superior business ability, has amassed considerable wealth. A real live, successful business man for governor is what Oregon needs, and that is what she will have when Mr. Furnish is voted into the gubernatorial chair in June. Week-kneed Republicans are very scarce in Oregon these gloomy Republican prosperity times.

It will be observed that the Demo-pox assessor does not offer a word in explanation of his action in reducing the assessment of Roseburg and vicinity to the tune of nearly \$100,000 during his term in office, which is at the expense of the other tax payers of the county. This is a matter of public record and is the more notorious when it is recalled to mind that the value of property has greatly increased rather than decreased in value in this city during this period of time. Mr. Gillette seeks to be popular with the large property owners of this city.

The Republicans of Oregon and Douglas county offer the voters a clean, intelligent and progressive platform, not to catch votes with, but to be lived up to and made into laws. The nominees are men who are identified with the development and business of the country and while they are Republicans they have no apogee to offer for their position, because they are Republicans from principle, so because their ancestors were. The spirit of the Republican party throughout its glorious career is to recognize the men who work for its success and are true to their pledges. **FIRST CAMPAIGN GUN**

**Republicans Opened County Campaign at Glendale.**

**GIVEN A HEARTY WELCOME.**

**Senator A. C. Marsters Delivered the First Campaign Speech in the State for 1902.**

GLENDALE, April 19.—The first republican gun for the 1902 campaign was fired at Glendale this Saturday evening and a rousing reception was tendered the speakers and the candidates. Senator A. C. Marsters was introduced as the first speaker, and his address was not only the first for the 1902 campaign in this county, but probably the first in the state. He dwelt almost wholly on county politics and paid each of the republican officials and candidates a glowing tribute. He referred to their splendid business-like administration and excellent records in the face of many adverse conditions, the folly of democratic "economy" forcing a great expense on the present county court for the improvement of roads, bridges, etc. Senator Marsters proved himself well informed on county affairs and made a very favorable impression on his hearers.

At this time when the great principles of the Republican party are being assailed by the opposition and when Democratic victory would mean the reversal of all that has been accomplished during the past four years, both by our Soldiers and Statesmen, no Republican can afford to vote for a Democrat for any political office.

One of the Democratic candidates for representative of Lane county has got cold feet and asks that his name be left off the ticket. We will wager a penny that some of the candidates of the same faith in this county are beginning to feel mighty shaky. Well they may, for old Douglas will roll up the largest Republican majority in her history in June.

Attempted Assault.

Mention was made in our last issue of an attempted assault made last week by a stranger upon the person of Lucy, the 12 year old daughter of Mrs. Lewis Ned on Little River and the particulars are as follows: The little girl was returning home from school when at a point near the Watson place she met a stranger who talked with her and finally seized her and attempted to rape her, but the girl's screams brought John Watson to the scene and the stranger running himself with rocks kept Mr. Watson at bay and finally made his escape into the brush. The neighbor joined in a search for him, but without success. However, he was apprehended, on R. B. Dixon's place, six miles east of Roseburg Thursday night, while seeking food, by Messrs. Hatfield and Carlile and brought to town.

He was given a preliminary hearing Friday at which he gave his name as Jas. Smith aged 28 years. He is an Englishman and says he came from Gold Hill where he worked a while, to Roseburg. He said he was looking for work on the East Umpqua and was tempted by the actions of the girl, to commit the assault, but little credence is placed in any of his stories. He was held in the sum of \$1000 to the circuit court and being unable to furnish bonds is languishing in jail. He is good for a good long term in the penitentiary.
