How Russia Deals with the Liquor Question. In the effort to curtail the consumption of alcoholic beverages, which was fast becoming a national curse, the Russian Government made the manufacture of alcohol a government monopoly. And not only that, but the state is the only dealer in alcohol, and whatever is sold is strictly pure and unadulterated. All over Russia you will find the sign: "Liquor Depot No. 1." And if you go inside one of these you will see a counter protected by brass wire netting reaching to the ceiling, as in a bank. There are no tables or chairs. Not a bottle is in sight. Three different kinds of liquor measuring ability degrees, is sold. The last in the volka, a raw whisky of grain spirit effect manufactured from grain. The customer is not allowed to drink in the liquor shops. He takes the bottle with him. These places are open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. No liquor may be sold to intoxicated persons, children or soldiers, except officers. The law has been in force since 1925, and while it has not accomplished all that was hoped for it has had the effect:

Ohio River Horror.

CAIRO, Ill., April 21.—A blacked, hulksized wreck, lying on the Kentucky shore, 15 miles above this city, is all that is left today of the handsome steamer "Ohio River Horror," which burned to the water's edge Sunday morning. Within the ruins are still scattered bodies of the scores of passengers and members of the crew who were caught like rats in a trap and roasted alive. It is still impossible to ascertain the actual number of the dead, but it is believed that not more than 100 perished. The burning of the vessel is accounted one of the worst river disasters in recent years. The panic that followed the fire was such as has seldom before been witnessed on a river steamer. The people rushed in every direction. Some jumped through windows on to the deck and then into the river, not stopping to put on life preservers. Boat from the shore took off numerous passengers. The burning steamer was quickly headed for the bank. A number of passengers who jumped off through the stern and tried to swim ashore through the swift current were drowned. Many managed to get to the shore, where five were killed, and the poor women and children, many of whom in their night dresses, sufficing with the cold and from their own clothing, huddled about to keep warm. People clung to shutters and anything they could find to float on to shore, and only a few succeeded. The case of Mrs. Fannie McCallum of Leavenworth, Ind., is most pitiful. With her three children she was going to Carthage, Mo., to join her husband. She jumped overboard and landed in a boat, but her three children struck the water and she saw them sink from sight. She was frantic with grief. The body of the young 11-year-old son, who was drowned, was recovered opposite Mound City. Captain Doss, who was drowned, was an old river pilot. He was making the trip for pleasure with his son, Phil Harry Doss, and when his boat was found a mile or so below the wreck, he had on all his clothing and a life preserver. It is believed he died from the shock.
