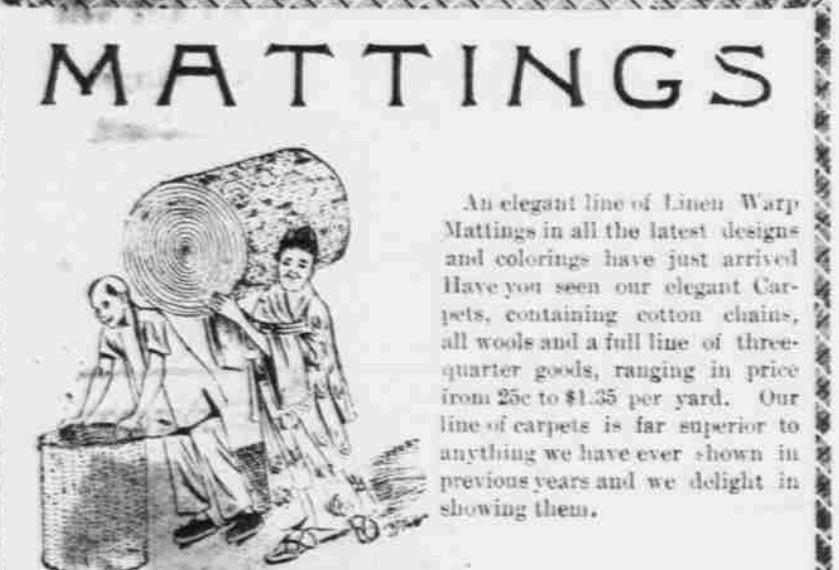

LATE NEWS SUMMARY

Important Events of the Past Few Days.

STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.

Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.

Agency recruiting office has been opened in Portland.

Forty thousand immigrants have come into the state of Washington so far this year.

The wool season has opened at The Dalles, and business will open up in that community soon.

According to the Astoria News, the run of salmon is very much better this year than last season.

The Indiana republican convention has adopted a resolution endorsing the Roosevelt administration.

Senator Clark, the millionaire United States senator from Montana, was arrested by a policeman Friday for bicycle speeding in Washington.

The jury has found a verdict of "not guilty" in the case of the state against Berry Howard, indicted for being accessory to the killing of Governor Geobel.

When Mr. Chamberlain was following Bayan and his platform Mr. Furnish was supporting McKinley and sound money. Republicans would do well to consider this before deciding to go against their party in June.

Hon. H. V. Gates, the promoter of the new telephone line from Ashland across the Cascades to Lakeview, says the poles have been contracted for along a large portion of the route and the wire is now in Ashland to reach from this place to Klattah Falls.

Bert Case, who has been engaged in the livery and feed business for the past four years in Roseburg, has disposed of his business and is at present stopping with his mother, Mrs. Case, of this place, while he seeks another location. He informs that he will visit California with a view of locating there--Molford Mail.

The supreme court of this state has just decided that when wheat is sold from a warehouse without authority of the depositor, the depositor may recover from the purchasers. This case grew out of the shortage of 11,500 bushels of wheat in T. J. Black's warehouses at Halsey and other points in Union county. This decision brings protection to the farmer and will prevent warehousemen from selling short.

ADMINISTRATION IN EARNEST

Has Laid Strong Foundation on Which to Prosecute the Packers Trust

Chicago, April 25.—Preliminary steps to prepare cases against the packers was taken today, and when Special Attorney Day arrives from Washington actual work on preparing the bills will be begun.

It is announced today that the government's investigation, which will be conducted entirely in Chicago, will be national in its scope.

Lawyer Day is bringing with him the fruits of a month's work by attorneys in various parts from New York to San Francisco, on which evidence it is expected the packers will be convicted of organizing and operating a trust.

The District Attorney's office has issued a call for any evidence that any person may have to the effect that the packers are acting in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

Federal officials here are confident that evidence is at hand sufficient to cause conviction in a number of cases.

A number of employees of the stockyards and packing houses have signified a willingness to give testimony showing the existence of the trust.

LATEST NEWS.

Roosevelt Urges Immediate Canal Legislation. No Peace in South Africa.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—President Roosevelt insists that it is the duty of congress to consider the Nicaragua canal question without delay.

NO PEACE.

AMSTERDAM, April 25.—A local newspaper today prints an interview with President Kruger of the Transvaal, in which the former President is quoted as saying that peace negotiations have been completely broken off and all British conjectures in the matter are apocryphal.

FOR THE EXPOSITION.

PORTLAND, April 24.—Sealed proposals will be received at the office of Lewis and Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition and Oriental Fair, until Saturday, May 3, 1902, at 5 p. m., for a site for the Exposition to be held in Portland in 1905, in honor of the 100th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark expedition in Oregon. Proposals must be accompanied by plats showing definitely the location and bounds of the land offered for a site.

WHAT REPUBLICANISM IS DOING.

The Triumphs of Expansion. Extracts from Great Speech of Senator Beveridge, of Indiana.

The need of industrial civilization is markets, and British expansion has given England sales of \$300,000,000 annually to her dependencies.

The Democratic policy toward the Philippines is a policy of decrepitude.

We shall not turn the Philippines back to barbarism or abandon them to rival powers, or haul down the flag. We shall do our work like Americans and men till all the East shall bless the name of the great Republic and all mankind shall cheer American beneficence.

Taking no thought of the morrow is the counsel of insolvency.

Since the war with Spain our farms have increased \$1,200,000,000 in value, our productive investments over \$500,000,000, our factory payrolls have increased \$500,000,000 a year. Interest on the public debt is \$7,000,000 a year less, and the balance of trade in the five years since McKinley was first inaugurated is \$2,700,000,000 in our favor. Who, then, is injured by expansion?

Upon the grave of every American soldier, wherever he yielded up his life, let the grateful tears of the Nation fall. And in the cause for which American soldiers have given up their blood let the whole world know that the American people are united.—Extract from the opening campaign speech in Indiana made last Thursday at Indianapolis by Senator A. J. Beveridge.

Contract Signed and Money Deposited in Bank.

GEER PETITION CIRCULATED.

Praying that His Name be Placed on Ticket for U. S. Senator.

CORVALLIS, April 24.—J. C. Long returned from Portland yesterday, bringing some good news concerning the Bohemia railroad. While at the meeting Mr. Long, Mr. Moody and J. H. Bingham paid Mr. Koller of the S. P. railroad a visit and found him in excellent spirits on the subject of railroads. Mr. Koller told them that he had learned that the money for constructing the proposed road to Bohemia was already on deposit in Portland and he said to them, "That will build the railroad."

Mr. Koller also disclosed the fact that the S. P. Co. has set apart \$1000 for the purpose of building a new depot at Cottage Grove and he assured our men that it would be a union depot, and that the Bohemia road could be connected with the S. P. road and the one depot used for both.

The grounds around the depot will be seven tracks will be filled in with crushed rock and surfaced with granite in the latest approved style for depot grounds.

Contracts were signed up yesterday for the grading and laying of ties for the first 10 miles of track. Alexander & Campbell of this city are the local contractors and they, as the Pacific Timber Co., have intimate business connections with Mr. Ladd, of the Ladd & Tilton Bank of Portland, and the bonds for the contractors will come through that bank. Your correspondent is informed that two methods of ties are already on the road and we expect to see them on the job track here in a day or two.

It was learned this morning that the republicans are practically settled and also that the contractors expect to get to work the first of next week.

A GEER PETITION

Document is Being Circulated Throughout the State Urging Geer for U. S. Senator.

"We want T. T. Geer for United States Senator."

Such is the substance of a petition being circulated throughout the state. For several days past it has been understood that petitions of a similar nature were being passed around in the Willamette Valley towns and Jackson county, but not until late last week did any make an appearance in this county. The petition came as a surprise. Where the petition came from is not stated, but the one most active in its circulation in Douglas county is said to be Hon. G. W. Biddle.

The preamble to the petition is short. It says that those appending their names are duly qualified electors of the Republican party; that the signers believe T. T. Geer represents the principles of the Republican party, and that T. T. Geer is their choice for United States Senator.

This petition is not being circulated without the knowledge or consent of Governor Geer, according to the Telegram. It is asserted that Governor Geer is thoroughly informed on the matter and is desirous of having as many signatures as possible.

"Governor Geer" declared a man interested in the circulation of the document, "wants to be placed on the official ballot as the choice of the Republican party for United States Senator, as provided for under the Mays' law. His great desire is to receive more votes in June than W. J. Furnish receives for Governor."

In view of the recently published statements of Governor Geer that he intends to retire from politics and is not taking any part in the Senatorial fight, the foregoing declaration is peculiar. The petition, when filled, will be forwarded to the Secretary of State, with others being circulating in other sections of the state, for a place on the ballot in June.

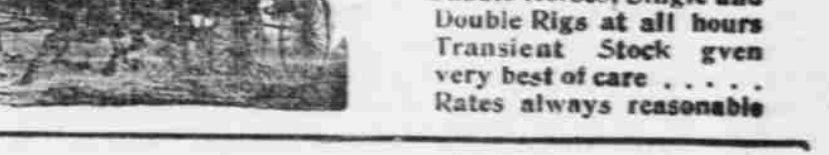
