# INNOCENT MAN SHOT

By Roseburg's Deputy Marshal, Frank Reed.

T. C. OWEN IS THE VICTIM

A Young School Teacher of Myrtle Creek. Sought to Evade Arrest as a Suspect.

A sad and most deplorable tragedy was enacted in Roseburg this morning soon after the arrival of the 4:25 o'clock south bound overland, in which the deputy city marshal, Frank Reed, and a young Myrtle Creek school teacher, figured as principals.

It appears that Deputy Reed, who is serving as deputy in conjunction with Marshal Finas Billard, had recently received notification from the Eugene officers to look out for a man wanted at that place on the charge of stealing an overcoat. Deputy Reed accordingly was on guard at the depot when the morning overland pulled in hoping to be able to recognize and apprehend the party wanted, a description of whom he had in his possession. As to the incident leading up to the deplorable tragedy which was enacted after the train halted at the depot, Mr. Reed gives the following version:

A Plaindealer reporter saw Reed at the Sheriff's office at the court house at 11 a. m. today and asked if he would make a statement for publication. He consented to do so and spoke as follows: "I had received a notice from Eugene giving the description of a man wanted at that place for larceny of an overcoat and was on the lookout at 4:25 a. m. on the south bound overland, when it arrived at the depot here, for a man who might get off, answering the description. I went to the front end of the first blind baggage and brakeman Bob Madley, who was near called my attention to a man who got off the train north of me. I started toward the man and asked him to stop for keeping going from me and I then demanded him to stop saying, 'I want to see who you are.' He looked over his left shoulder and asked, 'Who are you?' I answered, 'I am the marshal.' He then said, 'Go to hell' and started to run. I followed and arrested him to stop. He ran north opposite to Mrs. Josephine's warehouse and then west across the wagon platform of the warehouse. I followed, discharging the sprays of the platform and intended to fire to frighten him, but when I looked where my gun was pointed, I found it aimed directly at Mr. Flood's house. I then pointed in the direction of the barn and fired at the ground.

I think the bullet struck a rock in the gravel and glanced striking the man. He fell and I thought he had fallen to keep me from firing again. He was then about 45 yards ahead of me. I ran to him and found he was shot. I pulled him out of the middle hole into which he had fallen and called for help. John Beckley, the night watchman and a brakeman came to me. I sent the brakeman for a doctor, and Beckley and I got the man on the gravel where it was dry, and I held him on my arm until Dr. Twidwell came. We then took him to Mr. Kitchell's hospital. I stayed with him until Dr. Miller arrived, but I went to Harry McCallahan's, the deputy sheriff and gave myself up. The gun I had was a Smith & Wesson 38 calibre revolver. I did not tell the man I had a pistol or was going to fire. 'I did not shoot at him, but at the ground to the right of him.' THE VICTIM IDENTIFIED.

Upon examination it was found that the wounded man was a well known and highly esteemed young school teacher and laborer of Myrtle Creek, this county, that for the past week he had been at Cottage Grove expecting to be able to find more remunerative employment at that place than he had been engaged in at his home, not having been employed in school work for some little time. He bought a ticket at Cottage Grove and was on his return home when he was approached by the deputy marshal at this place, and it is supposed that his actions here were due to the fact that he was frightened or disliked the possibility of being detained here on some charge of which he was innocent, yet of which he must prove himself not guilty, and hoped by fleeing to escape the officer and proceed on his way home.

THE FATAL WOUND.—An examination of the wound which resulted in the death of the young man, revealed the fact that the ball entered a little above the center of the back of his head and lodged evidently in the brain or skull near the base of the nose. Strange to say he lived about four hours after he was shot, but never regained consciousness. A post mortem examination is in progress as we go to press, which will no doubt demonstrate whether the ball struck the young man directly from the revolver or after striking some obstacle and glancing as it is claimed by the marshal, there being no witness to the shooting and the coroner's inquest, which will be held tomorrow will no doubt fix the responsibility.

DEPLORED BY ALL.—The affair has created much excitement in this city and is generally deplored and commended whether accident, or not, as rash judgment and almost criminal recklessness was displayed in the whole matter, many even questioning the authority of the officer who was attempting to make the arrest, it being stated that he was appointed on special police duty by a former council, but had never been re-appointed by the present mayor or council, yet was still permitted to serve in the capacity of deputy marshal.

MOTHER OF DECEASED ARRIVES.—The mother and sister of the unfortunate young man arrived in Roseburg this morning.
