### LATE NEWS SUMMARY

Important Events of the Past Few Days.

### STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.

Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.

A movement is on foot to organize a fruit combine for Oregon at Portland. The receipts at the Portland post-office for April were \$5,781.29 more than in the same month in 1901.

W. N. Daniels of the La Grande creamery had to pay a \$30 fine for selling short weight butter last week.

The Standard Oil company was the first to pay its \$500 subscription to the Lewis and Clark centennial stock.

It is stated that the late cold rains have damaged the Italian prairie crop slightly in the Willamette Valley.

Since March 31 last 11,000 immigrants have landed in Spokane, as a result of the cheap railroad rates from the East. Queen Wilhelmina is better, and the people of the United States are glad of it, and hope she will live long and be happy.

The Corvallis creamery has received an order for two hundred 100-pound boxes of butter. This certainly speaks well for the reputation of H. W. Kaupisch, proprietor of the creamery, as a maker of butter.

The Indian War Encampment Veterans have passed a resolution requiring candidates to the legislature to favor the payment of a debt contracted under the territorial government in suppressing Indians, amounting to over \$500,000.

United States District Judge, Hon. C. B. Bellinger, at Portland Tuesday gave a ruling in the case of the litigation between the city of Medford and the Sunset Telephone and Telegraph Co., in which he decided the city had no right to impose a license of \$100 per annum on the company, and the injunction restraining the city from removing the poles and wires of the company is still in force.

### Vote To Be Shy.

PORTLAND, May 9.—It appears highly probable that when the registration books close next Thursday 20,000 voters in Oregon will have failed to register. Conservative estimates from all parts of the state place the total registered vote at nearly 9000 less than in 1900, with no account taken of an influx of nearly 11,000 in the voting population in the last two years. In Marion county, for example, it is estimated that 1000 voters will not register. The shortage in Baker county is expected to reach 900. Five counties are in the 400 column, four in the 300 and six in the 200, with the other counties ranging from 96 to 161. Multnomah county is expected to register the same vote it did in 1900, although it has easily increased 3000 in voting population since then. In only two counties is an increase expected. Morrow and Lincoln, 50 in the former and 35 in the latter. A table on this page shows the registered vote in 1900, the registration to date this year, the probable total and the estimated increase in two years.

### FACTS WORTH CONSIDERING.

Wonderfully Prosperous Times the Country is Now Experiencing Under Wise Policies—Who Wants a Change?

The fact is, no country has ever experienced so high a degree of prosperity as has this country since the republican party came into control in 1896. the largest foreign commerce of any Nation in the world at the same time, paying to its laborers the highest wages of any nation in the world? But did the gold standard contract the volume of our circulating medium as the democrats party said it would? Did it make money dearer, as they told us it would? Not at all. On the contrary, there is more money in circulation today per capita in this country than ever before in all its history, and money is cheaper, that is, it can be borrowed at a lower rate of interest than ever before. Why do you remember that during the last democratic administration, the government was compelled to issue bonds in order to obtain money with which to meet the current expenses of the government and to maintain the treasury balance, that it had to pay as high as 5 per cent per annum interest? I say, do you remember that? It is a fact. Yet, since the republican party has come into power, so great is the confidence of the people in the correctness of its policies, so splendid a credit has it given to its government, that nearly all the bonds issued by the democratic administration have been paid off with money derived from the sale of bonds drawing only 2 per cent interest per annum. Think of it, only 2 per cent per annum! Something that no other Nation in all the world has ever been able to do. But that is not all. That 2 per cent interest bearing bond is today selling on the market of the world at a premium of 8 per cent and I, myself, know of a transaction a few months ago where a national bank being compelled to purchase bonds to secure its circulation, paid \$1.08 per dollar in the open market for the 2 per cent, interest-bearing government bonds.

Such is the record of the republican party; two words will describe it—prosperity, progress. You have tried it for a third of a century, and during all that time it gave you prosperity and progress, with widening development of our resources, with increasing values for the employed. You have also tried the democratic party. You placed it in control of congress and gave it the presidency. They wove their doctrines into legislation. Immediately every industry was paralyzed, while every branch of trade and commerce became stagnant and still. Then the republican party again came into power, and with it came hope and confidence and new life and prosperity. Do you want to abandon these? If so, vote the democratic ticket. —Extract from C. W. City of 25,000 Souls Buried in Molten Lava.

### CHOLERA RAGING IN MANILA

Rebellion in China, Sensation in Congress. Three New States.

PARIS, May 9.—The commander of the French cruiser Suetet has telegraphed to the Minister of Marine, M. de Lanessan from Fort de France, Martinique, under the date of Thursday, May 8, at 10 p. m., as follows: "Have just returned from St. Pierre, which has been completely destroyed by an immense mass of fire which fell on the town about 8 in the morning. The entire population (about 25,000 souls) is supposed to have perished. I have brought back the few survivors, about 30. All the shipping in the harbor has been destroyed. The eruption continued."

St. Thomas, D. W. I., May 8, 7 p. m. —The British steamer Robham, Captain Freeman, which left St. Lucia Wednesday for Martinique, returned there at 5 o'clock this afternoon, bringing a report that the town of St. Pierre, Martinique, has been totally destroyed by volcanic disturbances in the island. Almost all the inhabitants of St. Pierre are said to have been killed. The Robham reports that all the shipping in the port has also been destroyed. The Quebec Steamship Company's steamer Robham, Captain Moggart, is mentioned as being with all on board. The Robham was almost completely wrecked. Her captain was seriously burned, and 17 of her crew are dead.

### WHAT IS EXPECTED OF OREGON.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says: "The Republican party expects to hear grand news from Oregon on the night of June 2d. The Oregon Republicans expect to roll up a good-sized majority for their ticket. More than once that June election in Oregon has given encouragement to the Republican party of the country in important national canvasses. There is good reason to suppose that the same state will rise to the importance of the occasion in the present instance, and by the magnitude of its Republican vote, inspire enthusiasm in the party in the rest of the country. The eyes of the United States will be on that historic commonwealth for the next few weeks."

### Cholera Raging in Manila.

MANILA, May 9.—The cholera statistics to date are as follows: Manila, 807 cases and 706 deaths; the provinces, 2452 cases and 1805 deaths.

### South China City Bombaraded.

HONG KONG, May 9.—Advices received here from Wai Choo say the rebels bombarded Nan Ning Fu for three hours April 27, using modern field guns. From 300 to 400 of the inhabitants were killed. The rebels subsequently withdrew to the hills.

### New Stars for Our Flag.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The omnibus statehood bill for the admission of Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma, passed the House without division today. These states are now half in the union.

### Sensation in Congress.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Delegate Marcus A. Smith, of Arizona, was taken ill on the floor of the House today at the close of a brief but vehement speech on the statehood bill, in which he is deeply interested. The three doctors in attendance united in making the following statement, at 2 o'clock: "It is impossible to determine now how serious the attack is. There is a tendency to apoplexy."
