Crossed the Plains With Furnish.

McMinnville, May 12.—Henry Gee, of this city, has the distinction of being, so far as known, the only survivor in the western half of Oregon of the little party which crossed the plains by ox-team in 1865, and which contained among its members Hon. William J. Furnish, aged a child of 3 years. Mr. Furnish and Mr. Furnish were last seen in the middle of each other in Rainier, County, Missouri. They crossed the Missouri river for Oregon, May 20, and together traveled to Green River, then rode on horse-back all the way, and led a pack. He remembers, as it were only yesterday, of the Furnish boy straying from camp a short distance, and running a prickly pear in one of his bare feet. Green rode out and carried him back to camp. While on Lost River the party was nearly lost by the death of the head of the Furnish household. After reaching Oregon Mrs. Furnish and family became residents of Polk County, and Mr. Gee located in Yamhill. He has not seen the Furnish boy since, and will take peculiar delight in meeting him when he shall visit McMinnville.
