Prof. L. R. Traver tendered Superintendency of Salem Schools.

Recognizing the superior ability of Prof. L. R. Traver as an education the Salem School board met last Saturday evening and tendered him the superintendency of the Salem public schools. Prof. Traver is just completing his fourth year's work in the Roseburg public schools and a review of his work shows remarkable progress and advancement in every grade and branch of the school, and especially in the high school department. It was also through his urgent recommendation that the public school building was greatly enlarged and modernized to meet the growing demand of the school. We are not yet informed as to whether Prof. Traver will accept the position tendered him, but can say that his valuable services here have been thoroughly appreciated here, and that both the students and school patrons would regret to see him leave our city.

Local Labor Organization.

At the Court House, Sunday afternoon G. Y. Harry, President of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, addressed the wage earners of Roseburg and vicinity, upon the benefits of the national labor organizations. Mr. Harry gave an exhaustive review of the past year's work both the employers and employees by the organization of the laboring class.

At the conclusion of his address it was decided by the meeting to organize a general union as in many towns there are not sufficient members to form a distinct organization, and temporary officers were elected. Twenty-five members signed the roll. Permanent organization will be effected as soon as a charter is received from the American Federation of Labor. Retail Clerks Union will be organized this evening.
