LATE NEWS SUMMARY

Important Events of the Past few Days.

STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.

Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.

Medford is talking or holding a street fair this fall.

The Willamette Valley fruit crop has been seriously damaged by the late cold rains.

The mail boxes are being distributed preparatory to the establishing of a free delivery system at Eugene.

The general synod of the Presbyterian church has unanimously voted to accept the creed as prepared and reported by the committee appointed on revision.

The Senate Friday afternoon took a recess of 30 minutes to enable the members to partake of a 60-pound salmon, the gift of Senator Mitchell of Oregon.

Both houses of Congress have just passed the bill to build a railroad bridge across the Columbia river near Vancouver, Wash., opposite Portland.

The situation in Portland is a serious one, and it looks very much as if there will be a tie-up of the industries of that city. Reasonable men ought to be able to get together and arbitrate their differences.

WORK OF ODD FELLOWS.

Joe Micelli of Roseburg, Elected Deputy Grand Master.

Newport, May 23.—The old Fellows' Grand Lodge convened Wednesday at 9 a. m., when the grand lodge degree was conferred on 147 new members. Every grand officer was present except the grand herald. The reports of officers show an increase of 330 in subordinate membership; total membership, 8500. The Rebekahs show an increase of 800, and total membership of 600.

A proposition to make Portland the permanent home of the grand lodge was defeated. Portland was unanimously chosen the place of holding the next session.

There was no new legislation of importance. The trustees of the Odd Fellows' Home reported the present building in Portland completely finished, furnished and full of occupants. Two thousand dollars was appropriated to put up an additional building. A per capita tax for the ensuing year of 60 cents, and 40 cents extra for the support of the home was levied.

On Thursday the various committees reported on the reports of the grand officers.

The grand lodge adjourned after installing the following officers: Robert Andrews, of Portland, grand master; Joe Micelli, of Roseburg, Deputy Grand Master; J. A. Mills, of Independence, grand warden; E. K. Sharon, of Portland, grand secretary (re-elected for the ninth time); Bron E. Miller, of Portland, grand treasurer; I. W. Hope, of Vail, grand marshal; H. M. Beckwith, of Portland, grand conductor; J. C. McKern, of North Yamhill, grand guardian; F. M. Frieberg, of Marshfield, grand herald.

A SPLENDID RECORD

Thos. H. Tongue a Zealous Worker for His State.

AIDS OREGON APPROPRIATION.

Holds Important Committee Positions and is One of the Most Forceful Speakers

No man in congress from any state has more earnestly and zealously endeavored to serve the people of his district and his state without regard to political faith, or social or commercial position, than Thos. H. Tongue. He is now and has been since his first entrance into congress, one of the busiest men in that body. No man has ever written him a letter or made a request of him of any kind, which he has not in some way answered, and the infinite details of his daily work, would tax the energies of the most vigorous man. Mr. Tongue has made no attempt to distinguish himself in congress by the usual method employed by most of the members, that of making speeches, but has confined himself almost wholly to the practical features and duties of his position, as in this way only can a man do that service for his constituents which they demand, and to which they are justly entitled. Aside from the endless detail of correspondence amounting to an average of 75 letters a day, attending to questions before departments, carrying out personal wishes, granting personal requests, attending to pensions, to mail notices and contracts, to requests for government publications, and an infinite number of other things unnecessary to mention, he has secured the establishment of innumerable post offices, increase of mail service in numerous localities and a very

The River and Harbor Bill sent to the House Committee, and before additions and amendments had been made by the Senate, carried an aggregate appropriation for the Rivers and Harbors of nearly \$2,000,000, an amount of money equal to one fourth the entire appropriation for the State during forty-three years or since her admission to the sisterhood of States. For all the rivers and harbors of the United States, carrying an annual tonnage of 10,000,000 tons and less, an aggregate tonnage of 2,256,285 tons, there was appropriated by the House Committee \$417,000, which is something less than 20 cents a ton. One of this \$417,000 thus appropriated Mr. Tongue has written for the little state of Oregon, for Rivers and Harbors of this class, for Tillamook \$27,000 for Siuslaw river, \$25,000 for Coquille river, \$20,000 and for Cow Bay \$10,000—\$82,000 or nearly one-fourth the entire amount allowed for rivers and harbors of this class in the entire United States. This is a showing which cannot be approached by any other state in the union.

By the mouth of the Columbia the appropriation granted by the House committee on rivers and harbors, of which Mr. Tongue is a member, was \$1,500,000, the largest amount ever given for the Columbia, and for the Willamette river also. Portland and its tributaries, there was an appropriation of \$68,000, or more than has been before appropriated for the Willamette River in all the history of Oregon.

To the above may be added an appropriation of \$100,000 for a Federal building at Salem the first and only one in the district and an appropriation for the Chemawa Indian School, two or three times greater than ever before obtained for that school.

OREGON DELEGATION ON THE ELECTION

Senator Mitchell and Congressman Tongue Counsel Oregon Voters.

Senator John H. Mitchell wastes: "I regard the success of the entire Republican ticket, state, congressional and legislative, not only in Douglas county, but throughout the state, as of the utmost importance from a national standpoint. The issue joined in Congress between the two parties is one of immeasurable importance bearing upon the question as to whether we shall hold the Philippines and thus secure incalculable advantages commercially and otherwise or set them adrift. large number of free rural delivery routes. During his term he secured the first free rural delivery to the Pacific coast. While Mr. Tongue has not been heard often on the floor of Congress, such speeches as he has made, have been characterized by an ability which has made him a reputation of being one of the ablest and most forceful speakers in the lower house of congress. The first speech made by Mr. Tongue was during his first term in congress and on the Teller Resolution declaring that it would be in good faith to pay public obligations in silver.

Among something like a hundred speeches on this subject, made in the senate and house, the congressional campaign committee selected five to be circulated as campaign documents. Mr. Tongue's speech was one of these five. His next speech was in his second term, and was on the enactment of the gold standard law. The congressional committee selected extracts from six different speeches on this subject for distribution, and that of Mr. Tongue was one of these, and he was the only member of congress whose speech on both of these subjects was chosen for campaign purposes. Aside from those above mentioned Mr. Tongue has made speeches on the annexation of Hawaii, the Philippine question, Porto Rican tariff, on improvements at the mouth of the Columbia River, and all of these have been of such a character as to have been the occasion of very favorable press mention.

Mr. Tongue's committee assignments are something of an index to his standing both in congress and with the republican organization. When he received his appointment on the River and Harbor committee he had been in congress but one term. California had never held the position and neither had Washington. Both were applicants for it and both were strongly supported. At the same time Oregon had in the senate a member on the Committee on Commerce, and California had not, but desired it. In the face of these adverse conditions Mr. Tongue was assigned the very important position. At the same congress he was appointed chairman of the Committee on Irrigation of Arid Lands, a committee which he has made one of the most important in congress. No member of congress today having served so short a time, has two positions of equal importance.

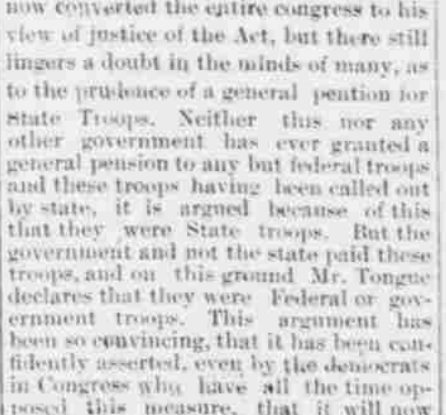
