## CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

### Grand Jury's Complaint to Republican County Officials.

Jas. V. Ware, alias Smith, ten years, for attempted rape.  
Harry Granelli, three years, for attempted train wrecking.  
Dan Saunders, three years, for burglary.  
Thos. Linn, alias Long, two years, for receiving stolen goods.  
Robt. Rooney, one year, same crime as Linn.

This is a complete list of the circuit court's contribution for this term to the list of inmates in the Oregon state penitentiary. The five culprits in custody of Sheriff Parrott and Deputy C. E. Hadley were taken to Salem Friday where they will pay the penalty of their crimes.

### A TIPPLE CASE.

Following the trial of Granelli Thursday for attempting to wreck a train, came the arraignment of his 17-year-old partner, Thos. Arnold, for complicity. The youth looks down, giving vent to his feelings by sobbing, evincing the sympathy of many in the court room. His parents live in Portland, from where he ran away to lead a checkered career. Owing to the fact that his testimony was mainly instrumental in convicting Granelli, and in consideration of his youth, he was given a sentence of only two months in the county jail. He was led from the court room crying piteously.

### GRAND JURY'S REPORT.

In The Circuit Court For Douglas County, Oregon.  
Final Report of Grand Jury.

To Hon. J. W. Hamilton, Judge.  
We, the Grand Jury of the May, A. D. 1902, Term of the Circuit Court for Douglas County, Oregon, make this our final report:

We have carefully investigated all criminal charges and complaints coming to our knowledge, which should be tried in the above court, and have acted in accordance with our best judgment.

Considering the number of indictments returned into the court by us, we have been in session some length of time, but this grand jury has considered a number of important matters and one charged with crime of great importance, which has occupied a great deal of our time to the most careful attention and a most searching investigation as to the facts and the law governing such cases.

That when we have been in doubt as to the law, we have presented the matter to your honor, who has instructed us concerning the same with the greatest of patience, care and thoroughness. At- tending to the facts, as we believe, we applied the law as instructed by your honor, and after mature deliberation, we decided the matter according to our best judgment as men and citizens, and our oaths as grand jurors.

### AN EFFICIENT SERVICE.

We visited the county jail and found eight prisoners confined therein. On account of an effort made short time ago by three prisoners to break jail, and thereby make their escape, and the escape of all prisoners therein, it has necessitated the sheriff keeping the prisoners securely locked within the jail cells both day and night, making their confinement uncomfortable on account of the small space of the cell room. We conversed with the prisoners and inquired of them with reference to their treatment, food and bedding. They represented to us that they were well fed and their bedding good and that the officers were courteous and kind to them.

### COUNTY OFFICERS WILL REPORT.

We next visited the various county officers and made an inspection of their books of record. We found them neatly and systematically kept, and the officers courteous and gentlemanly. We were made to feel at home in the office of School Superintendent Hamilton, his office being closed and he absent in the county engaged in school work. We further find that the room occupied by Assessor Gillette is too small for the various books of record, assessment rolls and other papers pertaining to the office, together with tablets, desks, etc., taking up so much space that the assessor and his deputies are more or less retarded in discharging their office work. We would therefore recommend that the adjoining room now occupied by an abstracting company be given the assessor for his use.

Having completed our labors we ask to be discharged.

### FURNISH EXONERATED.

Disgraceful Method Resorted to by the Democrats to Injure Hon. W. J. Furnish.

ROSEBURG, Oregon, May 23, 1902.  
To the Members of the G. A. R. of the State of Oregon:—We, the undersigned members of Kit Carson Post, No. 28, G. A. R., of Pendleton, Oregon, do hereby certify that the story sent out over the signature of Thomas E. James, a former member of this Post, accusing Wm. J. Furnish, republican candidate for Governor, of ordering the veterans of this Post out of line at a 4th of July parade in 1892 and applying violence and insulting epithets to them is false in every particular.

The facts are these: The committee in charge of the parade arranged the line of march and assigned the old soldiers an honorable position in the line. By mistake Kit Carson Post got in a place assigned some other organization. Mr. Furnish, who was Grand Marshal, directed his assistants to see that the order arranged by the committee should be carried out to prevent confusion.

When John Bailey Jr., now U. S. Commissioner, and then now a Democrat, a deputy marshal, saw the veterans were in the wrong place, he directed them to fall into the place assigned them by the committee. There was no insulting language and Mr. Furnish was not aware of the blunder made by the Post until after the parade was over.

It is believed here that Mr. James was paid by the Democratic committee to circulate the slander against Mr. Furnish.

Since James wrote the letter circulating the base slander, he was arrested for burglarizing the drug store of Brock & McComas in this city on May 1st, and stealing money, whiskey and morphine to give to his mistress. His guilt was so clear that he pled guilty to the 14th inst., and was sentenced by Judge Hill to three years in the penitentiary.

On the 15th inst., Sheriff Blakely, of this County, and now candidate for Representative on the Democratic ticket, started with James for the penitentiary. James is utterly unworthy of credit and his present location in the penitentiary is sufficient retribution of his slander.
