The election is over, and Oregon is Republican, as usual. Mr. Chamberlain has probably been elected Governor, by a small margin, but that by no means indicates that Oregon has become or is becoming a Democratic state. Mr. Chamberlain is a man that combined several elements of political strength, difficult to overcome. Mr. Furnish, an entirely worthy and capable candidate, happened to secure the nomination at a time when he found strong opposition within his own party. He need not be discouraged at this defeat, though, of course, it is for the time a hard disappointment. Mr. Furnish is a young man yet, and will be heard from, and will contend, politically, in one way or another. In this connection it is remembered that Hon. T. H. Tongue, two years before he was elected to Congress for the first time, was defeated for State Senator in Washington County by several hundred majority, by S. B. Hanton—now, by the way, a Republican; yet Mr. Tongue did not become discouraged and aimed still higher, and bit the mark, and from present indications he can stay in Congress as long as he chooses.

As was predicted, the Democratic leaders in Congress profess to see in the defeat of Governor in Oregon a rebuke to the Administration. They say the real test of the dominant party always comes on the head of the state ticket. They ignore the increased majorities of Republican candidates for Congress and the fact that local conditions in two counties controlled the vote for governor. Their expressions of satisfaction are but half-hearted, however, and they are convincing to one that their convictions are well founded. To his credit from all sections, President Roosevelt has expressed gratification with the result. Senator Hanna, chairman of the National Committee, said he regarded the result as an endorsement of Republican policies. In congratulating Representative Tongue upon his return to Congress, Speaker Henderson and Representative Payne, House leaders, took this view of the results, and pronounced a like result in other states next Fall.

In the campaign of vituperation argument which has just closed the voters have fully demonstrated the truth of our statement in the last issue of the election, that "The body of the people must not be set down as paying more attention to personal abuse than to their good horse sense." The one man, Hon. A. M. Crawford who was especially vigorously opposed, vilified and libeled by the opposition, can find consolation in the fact that the people have fittingly rebuked his defamers and again fully vindicated him by their hearty endorsement at the polls June 2nd.

While Frank H. Rogers, republican candidate for representative, is probably defeated, he has the satisfaction of knowing that his defeat was not due to any unpopularity on his part, but simply to his unfavorable position on the ticket, ditto marks taking the place of the word republican opposite his name, hence many people who voted for the men whose names appeared opposite the word, republican, skipped Mr. Rogers altogether. This was an unfortunate but unforeseen condition.

The majority of the voters of Douglas county must be congratulated heartily upon the good horse sense manifested in the late campaign. They have demonstrated the fact that they are unshaken and unswerving by falsehood and sensationalism, and hold principle, loyalty to their flag and country, above all appeals to prejudice.

But say, did you hear from the lower Umpqua country? There is a lot of horse sense in the crannies of the voters in that neck of the woods. Fiddle, Canyonville, Yoncalla, Drain, Oakland, Coles Valley, and many other Douglas county precincts don't need any instructions on "how to vote" either.

GOVERNOR IS IN DOUBT

Probable Majority of Mr. Chamberlain.

COUNTIES TO BE HEARD FROM.

Results are Estimated and Furnish Carries Two-thirds of the Counties.

Portland, June 4.—With five counties yet to hear from, and the probable majorities of those for either candidate furnished, Chamberlain possibly defeats Furnish for Governor by a few votes.

The five counties that because of remoteness and lack of means of communication have not heard from are Grant, Harney, Wheeler and Curry. It is estimated that Grant and Harney will each give Chamberlain 400 votes, Wheeler, Lake and Curry are probably of furnish by 300, 200 and 150 respectively.

Furnish has carried almost all the counties, but where Chamberlain has been he has done so with his majorities. Baker and Multnomah probably give Chamberlain 600; Union gives for the democratic candidate 577. Furnish's chances are 600; Clackamas, with 525 majority, Furnish has carried Wheeler, Oregon and it is his own county had given him. The majority it gave his opponent, the Republican candidate would have been received.
