### LATE NEWS SUMMARY

Important Events of the Past Few Days.

STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.

Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.

An effort is being made to arbitrate the strike in Portland between the planing mill owners and their employees. Mayor Elmer Williams is interesting himself in the matter.

It is a very modest volcano that is not letting itself be heard from these days. Ex-State Printer Frank C. Baker is said to have won \$2500 on the election. It is stated by him on the mayor of Portland and on Chamberlain.

Ex-Sheriff A. J. Nelson, of Lake County, was found guilty of embezzling \$3000 of the county funds by the jury Monday. Judge Benson will pass sentence. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court.

Gov. Gear has just received from his friend B. S. Pogue, governor of the Oregon weather bureau, news at Charleston, S. C., a vital of dust from the eruption of Mt. Pelee. Mr. Pogue authored it from one of the steamers which escaped by the skin of its teeth.

Engine people have decided not to celebrate the Fourth of July, saying their energy and money for the grand street fair and carnival to be given early this fall, the date to be decided upon at a public meeting Wednesday night. Business will be suspended all day on the 4th.

## LATEST NEWS.

### Gardiner-Coos Bay Stage Teams Dash into the Sea. One Team Drowned—Other News.

A RUN AWAY DISASTER.

GARDINER, May 10.—To the PLAINDEALER.—The Coos Bay and Gardiner stage line had quite an accident on the beach a few days ago.

Four horses were hitched on to the stage, to start out from their stable, one of the four not being driven on the team only occasionally become frightened and the infection spread to the others, whereupon they made a wild dash into the ocean. The leaders became loosened from the others and came out, the coupling pole broke and the wheelers dashed on to their death, with the front wheels. The driver Milton Cully sprang out and swam ashore. The hind wheels and box were recovered. The drowned horses and front wheels will likely be washed ashore by an incoming tide.

### PARTICULARS OF THE PENITENTIARY REVOLT.

SALEM, June 9.—The prisoners employed in the foundry were marched to work at 7 o'clock, and had entered the molding room, with Shop Guard Ferrell inside and Guard Stapleton in an adjoining room. Suddenly, without warning, Tracey and Merrill produced rifles, Tracey aiming at Ferrell, when Ingram, a life prisoner, attempted to disarm Tracey. Instantly Merrill shot Ingram and Tracey killed Ferrell, the latter falling forward and dying almost instantly.

The two prisoners at once made for the wall near the northeast corner of the stockade, where the scaled the wall by means of a ladder. When they were outside the wall Jones, on the northwest corner of the stockade, was killed, being shot twice, in the abdomen and breast, and killed instantly. Tiffany was also shot, and he dropped off the fence, engaging the men in a fight. His gun was soon empty, and he was taken by the escapes, and used as a shield. They made for the timber.

Out of range of the prison they stopped and deliberately killed Tiffany, escaping into the timber immediately. They had taken Tiffany's gun, but finding it empty threw it away. Duncan Ross, a new guard, was on the fence near Tiffany, having been ordered up to relieve the latter at his post. Ross was unarmed. These escapes shot at him, the bullet striking him in the forehead and the bullet glancing and inflicting a slight scalp wound. The three guards killed were all highly respected men, and all have families. Ferrell was a Woodman, and Jones was a prominent Odd-fellow and Workman. Ingram, the life convict who was shot by Merrill, was forced to undergo amputation of the left leg at the knee to save his life.

### INGRAM IS DEAD.

SALEM, June 9.—Ingram, the wounded prisoner, died this afternoon at 2:30. Ingram was a life prisoner and in attempting to take a rifle away from convict Tracey at the penitentiary in the break for liberty Monday, was shot through the leg by prisoner Merrill and the bone was shattered. Ingram was sent up from Linn county for killing his brother in 1901.

### INDIAN WAR VETERANS REUNION.

PORTLAND, June 11.—The Grand Encampment of the Indian War Veterans will meet in Portland June 17 at 9:30 A. M. Fare over Southern Pacific 1 1/2 rate. This will be the most interesting reunion the Indian War Veterans, their wives and widows have ever had. Veterans should bring their wives and all widows of Veterans should attend. The Sons and Daughters furnish a Banquet at 12 m. and supper at 6 p. m.

### TWO TERRIBLE DISASTERS.

LAKE PARK, Minn., June 10.—A tornado struck 12 miles north of here at 5:15 P. M. yesterday, sweeping a strip of land two miles wide and three miles long. It destroyed nine farm houses and killed 10 persons. The church at Spangle was demolished.

CHICAGO, June 10.—Of the 34 persons injured in the St. Luke's Hospital fire yesterday, it is feared that three will die, thus bringing the total deaths to 13.

### MT. RANIER IN LINE.

TACOMA, June 10.—Some excitement is caused by spurts of what is thought to be steam rising from the peak of Mount Ranier. The mountain has been a volcano, but is supposed to be extinct.

### MOST MUST DO TIME.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 10.—The Supreme Court this afternoon confirmed the sentence of one year's imprisonment imposed on Johan Most for publishing an anarchistic article shortly after McKinley's assassination.

## BOLD, BAW, MEN

### Escaped Convicts Rob Salem Man of Clothes

### STOLE HORSES AND RODE AWAY

Seen Later at Gervais. Blood-hounds on Their Trail. The Dead Guards.

SALEM, June 11.—During the night Tracey and Merrill, the escaped convicts, came through Salem, obtained citizens' clothing, stole a team of horses and rode northward, presumably to Portland.

About 10 o'clock last night J. W. Roberts, of South Salem, was going into his residence when he saw two men coming down the street. He stopped and arrested them interrogatingly. They presented guns at him, and invited him to accompany them to jail, and one of them, dressed his garments.

They then requested him to enter his house and remain until daylight under pain of death. He did as bidden, and only gave word of the adventure at 4 o'clock this morning.

In the meantime the numerous convicts, who escaped from the wagon shed of Experiment Farm in the same night, rode on, and having stolen several from the Othman place further south, were fairly equipped for travel.

They then passed through the main residence portion of the city to the northeast part, where they stole a team of bay horses belonging to Felix Lal-ranch, and rode northward.

A man who came to the city at 9:30 o'clock this morning, from Brooks, eight miles north from here, reports that the two men passed through that town, going westward, about midnight.

SALEM AT GERVAS.

GERVAS, June 10.—The two escaped convicts, Tracey and Merrill, were seen near Gervas this morning at 4:30. They broke into the residence of August King and forced him to furnish them with breakfast.

They asked about the different routes out of town, and leaving their horses, struck into the woods again.

One of the men wore a double and had a hat. Both were armed with rifles.

This afternoon the posse from Salem arrived in Gervais, and upon inquiry learned the above facts. They notified the authorities at Salem and proceeded upon their way.

It was 5 o'clock when the men left Gervais and were last seen one mile east of here on Pudding river, going through the woods. Blood hounds have been put on their trail by Sheriff Durbin.

### The Dead Guards.

Frank Ferrell, the first victim of the numerous convicts, was almost instantly killed, being shot through the heart. He fell where he stood, and after the exclamation "Oh, my God," never spoke.

S. R. T. Jones, the guard on post No. 2 was shot in the abdomen. He lived a few minutes, but sank rapidly, and before medical assistants could be secured he died, lying on the floor of his guard station.

R. F. Tiffany was shot in the back, while being held a prisoner by the two convicts who evidently aimed to use him as a shield. The convicts deliberately murdered him; he lived only a few minutes, and Ross, who was with him could do nothing for him, as life ebbed away rapidly, and the poor fellow died with a request to see his wife on his lips.

Frank B. Ferrell was born in this city on June 27, 1867, and would have been 35 years old on the 27th of this month. He was for many years employed at the flouring mills as a flour packer; served for a year on the police force and for the past four years as a guard at this prison. He leaves a wife, mother, four brothers and one sister. Deceased is a member of Salem Camp No. 118, Woodmen of the World, in which order he carried a benefit certificate for \$2,000. The funeral will be held from the family home at No. 645 State street, Wednesday afternoon under the auspices of the Woodmen. Interment in the Rural cemetery.

S. R. T. Jones, better known as Thurston Jones, was a native Oregonian. He was a son of Fielding Jones, the honored pioneer of Hubbard, and was born at that place on September 10, 1852. He lived there until three years ago, when he assumed the duties of guard at the Penitentiary, and removed his family to a farm one mile east of the prison. He leaves a widow, and eight children to mourn his untimely demise. The funeral will be held at Hubbard under the auspices of the L. O. O. F. and A. O. U. W., in both of which he was prominent.
