### LATE NEWS SUMMARY

Important Events of the Past Few Days.

STATE, GENERAL, FOREIGN.

Cream of the Dispatches Dished Up in Condensed Form for the Busy Reader.

Kilauea, the Hawaiian volcano, shows signs of activity after a ten years' sleep. The next legislature will consist of 24 republicans in the senate and 6 democrats. In the house the republicans have 48 members and the democrats 12. Washington county is to do its part in building the forty mile bridge across the Great Salt Lake. A contractor has commenced cutting long piling for that purpose in the timber near Ovation.

Friday morning on arising Miss Adelle Schetter, of Albany, got caught in a folding bed and when reached by her mother, who heard her screams, was unconscious, nearly smothered.

Gov. Whitaker, the first governor of Oregon, is still living at Eugene. He and Governor Meade are the only living ex-governors of the state. To them "age is like a luscious winter, frosty but kindly."

Hon. Henry Blackman, candidate for state treasurer of Heppner, has been in the city this week. He looks none the worse in consequence of his defeat.

Portland Dispatch. Wonder if he has introduced any Soldier Home bills lately. Oregon won the highest percentage of prizes at the Charleston exposition of any state in the Union. This is productive of a feeling of great satisfaction but not surprise, for Oregon is always a prize winner. The Oregon exhibitors received 238 medals and diplomas.

It is confidently anticipated that the official vote of Multnomah county will be finished by the time Governor Chamberlain elect is ready to take his seat. For shrewdness the officials who do vote counting and canvassing in Multnomah county are at the head of the class. The work they have done this year has been a disgrace to the state.

The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Express says a report has reached there from Constantinople to the effect that Arab tribesmen have massacred a caravan of wealthy merchants in the desert at a point 100 miles from Koweit, in Asiatic Turkey. According to the Constantinople report, only 20 persons out of the 500 who composed the caravan escaped.

Since the greater part of the whites have left Martinique the negroes imagine that the island is at length their own. They have met and elected a negro governor and other officers. The "governor" has already distinguished himself by looting and excesses. He is said to have amassed considerable wealth by pillaging houses all over the island. His followers are intemperate by drink and give themselves up to orgies of the most revolting description.

#### Roseburg's Close Call.

JERICHO CITY, June 12.—R. E. Veatch, conductor on a freight train between Junction and Roseburg, had a close call for his life on Wednesday. While attempting to board the engine of his train at Constock his foot slipped and he fell, striking his side on the corner of the tank, falling to the ground very close to the rail. Mr. Veatch thinks he fractured some of his ribs. He left for home on the overland feeling very sore.

#### Camas Valley.

## LATEST NEWS.

### Convict Ingram to be Pardoned—Rumor Says Crater Lake is Boiling—Other News.

INGRAM'S BRAVERY REWARDED WITH PARDON.

SALEM, June 15.—In answer to an inquiry of The Telegram this morning as to whether he contemplated pardoning Frank S. Ingram, the life term convict who was shot by Convict Merrill while trying to protect prison guards from being shot during the outbreak Monday, Governor T. T. Geer said:

"I am disposed to pardon Ingram, whose splendid action I believe deserves recognition, and unless valid objections should be raised and presented against such clemency, I think I shall take the matter up favorably in a week or so. There is no immediate hurry, as Ingram is not in condition to be moved yet, and besides I want to give time for all persons to be heard in the matter."

Ingram was sentenced to life imprisonment from Linn County for killing his own brother ten years ago. His wound was in the right leg, which was so badly shattered that amputation was necessary.

#### SISTER SAYS INGRAM ACTED IN SELF-DEFENSE.

INDEPENDENCE, June 15.—A sister of F. S. Ingram, the convict who came so near losing his life at the Penitentiary, is working in the hopyards across the river from this city. Her name is Mrs. Isabella Bundy. She was in the city Tuesday and learned the current report that her brother was dead. She visited the Penitentiary at once with a view of caring for the body, but learned for the first time of his probable recovery. Mrs. Bundy, while supposing he was dead, insisted in the innocence of her brother, who, she said, killed his own brother in self-defense. She returned in the evening and resumed her work in the hopyard.

#### CRATER LAKE BOILING.

Medford Oregonian: Crater Lake is beginning to boil and steam, according to reports of recent arrivals. Although none of those interviewed have seen the lake itself, they claim that clouds of steam could be seen ascending from where the Lake is located. As the volcanic eruptions of Pelee have already kindled so many fires in other craters, some believe it may be responsible for the boiling of Crater Lake, if reports are true.

#### WILL ASSAULT OLD GLORY.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—After several years of almost entirely theoretical work, the General Board of the Navy is now preparing to demonstrate by practical test the soundness of its theories. Rear-Admiral Philip H. Cooper has been placed "in charge of the preparation for war of the district extending from Chatham light, Cape Cod, to Barnegat light, New Jersey." Rear-Admiral Louis Kempff has been given duty of a similar character on the Pacific coast. These two officers will follow out the plans of the board by placing the defenses of this coast, which come under the control of the Navy in condition best to withstand a mimic attack of a foreign fleet, stimulated by the North Atlantic fleet on the one side and the North Pacific squadron on the other.

#### NO SUNDAY FAIR IN ST. LOUIS.

ST. LOUIS, June 12.—President Francis has been authorized by the exposition directors to sign a contract with Leslie M. Shaw, Secretary of the Treasury, in which the World's Fair management pledges itself not to operate the fair on Sunday at any time. This action was taken as the result of a letter from Secretary Shaw, requesting the company to comply with the Federal act appropriating \$5,000,000. The Secretary notified the company that none of the vouchers of the National Commission for salary or general expenses would be allowed, unless the contract was signed.

#### DEATH ON THE RAIL.

NASHVILLE, July 13.—Through a collision of passenger trains on the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad five persons are dead and sixteen injured.

#### KILLED UNDER ELECTRIC CAR.

PORTLAND, June 13.—Dr. McDaniel of this city slipped and fell under the wheels of an electric streetcar this forenoon. He was instantly killed.

#### TRUSTED EMPLOYEE WENT WRONG.

NEW YORK, June 13.—A trusted employee of the Western Union Telephone Company embezzled \$16,000 from the company and fleeing investigation of his account has disappeared.

#### CUBAN RECIPROCITY.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—President Roosevelt sent a special message to Congress today, advocating the enactment of a law providing for reciprocity trade relations with the Cuban republic.

#### CONVICTS FLUDE POSSE

NEEDY, June 14.—The chase for Tracy and Merrill has degenerated into a mere blind search. All efforts to pick up the trail today have proved futile. The posse is now wandering aimlessly in the neighborhood of the Graves ranch. If the trail is not found today, the search probably will be abandoned, and the whole party will return home. Company A, of Oregon City, joined the searching party today, having been ordered out last evening. The Salem and Woodburn Companies have been ordered home.

OSCEOLA, June 13.—Charles R. Smith confirms by telephone the report that a man closely answering the description of Merrill purchased tobacco in Mrs. Sewberry's store in New Era this morning. A farmer going toward New Era met two men carrying guns just the side of New Era, they jumped the fence and went towards the river. It is expected they will get a boat near or at Putnam's place and cross to the west side. From there they may go up to Madras and reach Portland via Willamette Falls and Oswego tonight. Company A, Oregon National Guard, returned from Madras this afternoon. Sheriff Clarke and Durbin and others of the posse were near Needy at last reports received here.

#### Coos Bay-Roseburg Railroad

MAXWELL, June 14.—Special to the Press-Scout.—The survey of the Coos Bay-Roseburg Railroad was started from Maxwell Friday at noon, and will reach this city by this evening. The debate between the Engineers and crew will move across the bay from Maxwell at once and commence the survey, or extend the survey toward Roseburg. The Company's general manager, Geo. C. A. Selvidge, and the engineers in charge of the survey expect to direct affairs from Maxwell for at least two weeks longer when Roseburg will become their headquarters and base of supplies. (There is some speculation out as to whether the new survey will follow the course of the old Coos Bay-Roseburg wagon road. A little time will tell.—E. J.)

#### Another Message for Reciprocity.

The president has his duty as he sees it, despite the warnings of the politicians. He regrets that he must thus oppose his warmest supporters, but cannot remain silent and create a false impression. The message was as follows: "We are a wealthy and powerful Nation; Cuba is a young republic, still weak, whose very life, whose whole future, whose very life, must depend on our attitude toward her. I ask that we help her as she struggles upward along the painful and difficult road of self-government and independence. I ask this aid for her because she is weak, because she needs it, because we have already aided her. I ask that open-handed help, of a kind which a self-respecting people can accept, be given to Cuba for the very reason that we have given her such help in the past. Our soldiers fought to give her freedom, and for three years our representatives, civil and military, have toiled unceasingly, facing disease of a peculiarly sinister and fatal type with patient and uncomplaining fortitude, to teach her how to use aright her new freedom. Never in history has any alien country been thus administered with such high integrity of purpose, such wise judgment and such a single-hearted devotion to the country's interest. Now I ask that the Cubans be given all possible chance to use to the best advantage the freedom of which Americans have such right to be proud and for which so many American lives have been sacrificed.
