Interpretation of the constitution of the state will be the chief element in the settlement of the question as to the salaries of state officers. The flat salary matter will, besides that of a United States Senator, absorb the attention of the coming Legislature.

This was the remark of a well-known Portland lawyer in conversation with the Journal. "I have noticed," he continued, "that verbal comment attributed to members of the constitutional convention that drafted the organic law of Oregon, have always been influential in directing the manner of interpreting that instrument. I have understood that Judge Statton frequently stated that it was not the intention of the constitutional framers to limit the state officers to the salary named, but merely to establish these stated salaries for the time being, and expected that future conditions would cause alterations as seemed best.

"Although such verbal statements are not to be considered in the interpretation of law by courts, yet it cannot be denied that the personally expressed views of members of the constitutional convention have wielded powerful influence upon the course of thought in that connection."

WHAT THE LAW SAYS.
The constitution says:
Article XIII, Section 1. "The Governor shall receive an annual salary of \$15,000."

Proceeding to give the salaries of the Treasurer and Secretary of State, the constitution then says:
"They (the Governor, Secretary of State and Treasurer) shall receive no fees nor perquisites whatever, for the performance of any duties connected with their respective offices, and the compensation of officers, if not fixed by this constitution, shall be provided by law."

SENATOR AND SPECIAL SESSION.
Gossip, discussion and even wagers are becoming common regarding the name of the next United States Senator. At present chances are even on all those mentioned openly as candidates. One view taken of the chances and methods of C. W. Fulton for the position includes a clever plan. It is said that Mr. Fulton will again be elected president of the Senate. He will then have the appointment of committees, including ways and means, appropriations, etc.

Was Whipped by His Mother-in-law.
A full-blood Acma Pueblo Indian, residing near Las Cruces, N. M., has committed suicide because he was whipped by his mother-in-law. Micaba had quarrel with his wife and he whipped her. He was in turn whipped by his mother-in-law. Unable to bear up under the indignity, he blew out his brains. This is the only suicide ever reported among the Acma Pueblos, and the old tribal men attribute it to the education received by Micaba at the Government schools.

Hanna Not a Candidate.
FLORIAN, Ala., June 24.—Senator M. A. Hanna of Ohio, in reply to a suggestion from Colonel Cutter Smith of this city that he become a candidate for President in 1904, has written Colonel Smith as follows:
"I appreciate sincerely the friendship which prompts the high compliment paid me in your suggestion. I am grateful for such confidence, but must insist that I am not to be considered in any sense as a candidate for President in 1904."

SALEM, June 25.—At Champoege, Marion County, this morning J. F. Markley shot J. D. Fain, wounding him dangerously. The men were partners in a store. Particulars of the affray are missing.

Senate Canal Bill Accepted.
WASHINGTON, June 23.—The House conference on the inter-oceanic canal bill has decided to accept the Senate bill in favor of the Panama route. The conference closed at 2:30 o'clock and the report will be made soon.

LITTLE HOPE FOR KING.
He is Lingerer Between Life and Death.
Another Big Portland Fire.
Loss about \$37,000. Thirty Fine Horses Perished in the Flames.

New York, June 25.—According to Sir Frederick Treves, who performed the operation on King Edward, and is himself one of the greatest living surgeons and specialists on abdominal troubles, the chance of death in cases of perityphlitis where abscess forms in that of King Edward, are about one in three. Sir Frederick Treves also declares that the period when death is most likely to occur if at all is from the fifth to the eighth day. Judging from the opinions of this distinguished physician, it may be assumed that either the King's condition has developed suddenly, or he has been very sick for several days, and physicians have been attempting to "patch up" their patient for this week's ceremonies.

END SCREAM SEAR.
London, June 25.—On high authority it is learned that the King's physicians are unable to offer any encouragement. His life hangs by a thread. The tubes described in accounts of the operation are not for drainage purposes, this authority states, but to replace a section of the bowel which has been removed. Nobody is able to live long with tubes so placed and the only hope is to remove the tubes, draw the bowels together and sew them. The chance of such an operation being successful are so slight that they are barely worth considering.

Another Portland Fire.
PORTLAND, June 25.—The second disastrous fire in three days broke out at 11 o'clock last night in the block of the old one-story buildings bounded by Seventh, Park, Gilliam and Hoyt streets and in a hours time had destroyed about \$37,000 worth of property, including some 30 head of horses, five of which were reared belonging to Tommie Condon, and the rest draught animals, the property of the Wakenan and Morse Transfer Company. Beside Condon and the transfer company, the principal losses were the City estate, the City & Suburban Railway Co., the Northwest Baking Company the Park Hotel house, Kule Bros., blacksmiths. There were several minor losses, as on a single building of the flimsy wooden structures that covered the block was left standing. The total loss, as near as could be learned last night, was \$37,000, covered by a total insurance of a little over \$7,000.
