

RAILROAD RUMORS.

Surveyors Working on Line From Coos Bay to Florence.

The following is from the Florence West of June 20, probably has connection with the proposed road:

"F. H. Rogers returned home from a trip to Coos county Sunday evening. From him we learn that a party of surveyors had surveyed a route for a railroad from Coos Bay to Winchester Bay on the Umpqua, and were then at work between the latter place and Gardiner."

"They informed him that they have instructions to extend the survey through Florence and expect a portion of the road will be built this summer. "The work is being done under the direction of A. M. Simpson, the lumber king, who owns a large tract of timber land between Coos Bay and the Umpqua, and another large tract between Gardiner and Florence."

"The road is to be a standard gauge, and while one object of Mr. Simpson is probably to transport his timber, it is thought that the line will be extended through to an eastern connection."

BOOTH IN EASTERN OREGON.

The following was written by the Eugene correspondent to the Oregonian:

"R. A. Booth, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., which recently purchased the land grant of 1,000,000 acres from the Military Wagon Road Company, has gone with R. J. Pengra to Eastern Oregon for the purpose of inspecting the lands belonging to the grant east of the Cascade range. This inspection is being made to determine the best manner of managing the lands to make them profitable. It is rumored that their visit has some significance in connection with the projected railroad from Salt Lake through Southeastern Oregon, crossing the Cascades to Eugene thence to the coast."

SAYS HE IS BENNETT.

And Implicates Others in the Murder of Nora Fuller.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—A special to the Examiner from Sedro-Woolley, Wash., says that a man confessing to be one of Nora Fuller's murderers, has surrendered himself to the City Marshal. He claims to be John Bennett, for whom the police have been searching for several months. "When I arrived here," he said, "I made up my mind that I must either relieve myself by making a clean breast of things or go crazy. In addition to what I have told you—and I have said more than intended—I have just a few more words to utter to shift the responsibility of the murder from my shoulders to where it belongs. The newspaper have been on the wrong track since the start. There was no strangled nation, no rape, no poisoning. That is all I will say just now about the cause of Nora Fuller's death."

"Yes, John Bennett is my proper name," he said, although I have been traveling under the name of John Flex. I am a printer by trade, carrying a union card, and was formerly connected with the Examiner. The big fool break I made in this whole business was to permit myself to be rushed out of Frisco and thus fasten the oons of the blame on myself. Certainly I was to blame for mixing up in the dreadful mess at the first, but there are others higher up in the social and professional scale than I could ever hope to be who will now have to suffer for the gruesome sin of the dreadful affair."

Bennett will not mention any names of Frisco people whom he alleges had a hand in the young girl's death. He says when the proper time arrives he will tell the story that will be the sensation of two continents.

The ship burned in Johnston's yard Saturday night at Portland was a huge, sea-going large built for the Wheeler Lumber Company of Nehalem, at a cost of about \$30,000. She was just about completed, having been launched three weeks ago, and it is stated that if one had had presence of mind enough the vessel could have been drawn on into the river and saved.
